BALLOT BOX STUFFING CASE AT TURNER

Several people were in town from Turner today trying to arouse interest in the ballotbox stuffing case at the road meeting recently. Road Supervisor Ben Robertson had to preside and on the question of levying a special tax forty voters were registered and forty-seven ballots were found in the hat and Ben declared it illegal and refused to entertain John McKinney's motion to adjourn. He demanded that another ballot be taken, but the crowd overruled him and the whole meeting went Democratic by a vote of 30 to ten. H. R. Crawford, a Democrat, was secretary. Levi Herren, a Democratic warhorse, moved that a special tax be levied, and C. A. Bear, a Socialist, seconded. The next thing in order on the part of the insurgents is to circulate a petition for a Democrat for road supervisor, one who will allow everybody to cast several votes instead of Ben Robertson who is altogether too stubborn in such matters as an honest count. The east side of the district is now suspected of raising a subscription to put in Ben's hands and have him work the roads on their side and in that way get even on the district meeting going Democratic and refusing to vote any tax whatever. It will take some great good road booster like ex-Judge Scott to come up there and get up a great big wave of enthusiasm if the campaign for fine macadamized roads in Turner district gets up very much headway.

UTILIZE A CRATER THAT WAS NOT BUSY

Honolulu, Jan. 6.—After two weeks of hard work, the army engineers stationed here today are nearing the completion of their task connecting coast fortifications by tunnels through the crater of Diamond Head.

The unique arrangement of the basins along the crest of Leahi enables the engineers to plan for an inner communication between the concrete emplacements. Instead of being compelled to go from one battery to another through costly tunnels or along the outer sides of the fortifications, the men in the batteries may use the short tunnels in to the volcano's crater and then traverse the crater to any part of the fortification.

The engineers are considering the use of the interior of the crater for barracks for the garrison.
