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REVOLUTION IN INDIA FEARED BY ENGLAND

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Jan. 7.—Discovery that the Hindu revolutionary party has followed the example of the young Turks, the Russian terrorists and other fighting political organizations in establishing headquarters outside of its own country has given the India office the unpleasant shock it has had since the movement to free the dependency from British domination became formidable.

That the natives' warfare against English rule can be conducted almost as conveniently from Europe or America as in India has been shown by the recurrence of bomb outrages in Bengal almost simultaneously with the discovery of one of the revolutionists' agencies in Paris. The French police have, indeed, unostentatiously aided England in watching the Paris organization but for taking actual steps toward breaking it up, the Gallic government is understood to have informed the British, the evidence is too weak. Even rooting it out of France, it is feared here, would have no other effect than to cause its transfer to some city where England might look for less sympathetic treatment from the authorities. That there are, in fact, already branches in Berlin, Vienna, Canada and perhaps elsewhere is strongly suspected.

MISS BONEACRE CLIMBS INTO LOTS OF TROUBLE

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Bernardino, Cal., Jan. 7.—After remaining for seven hours on a narrow ledge above Bonita falls and being rescued as she was about to fall from exhaustion, Miss Gladys Boneacre is today in a serious condition at the Glen Ellen Hotel, near here. Miss Boneacre was rescued by Douglas Champion, after he and the young woman narrowly escaped being crushed to death by a great boulder which had been dislodged by the rescuers working above them.

The plight of Miss Boneacre was not discovered until she had been for four hours on the narrow ledge, which she had reached in the course of her mountain climbing. She was seen by Champion, who summoned aid from the hotel, and a rescue party, armed with ropes, began the task of liberating the girl. Champion was lowered to the ledge. He tied a rope about Miss Boneacre's waist, and she was drawn up to safety. Champion himself was then hauled up by the other rescuers.

NEW COMPANY TAKES PLACE OF THE OLD

Butte, Mont., Jan. 7.—Articles of incorporation were filed today for the Chicago and Puget Sound Railway Company, which takes over all the property of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul from the Missouri river bridge to the Pacific coast.
