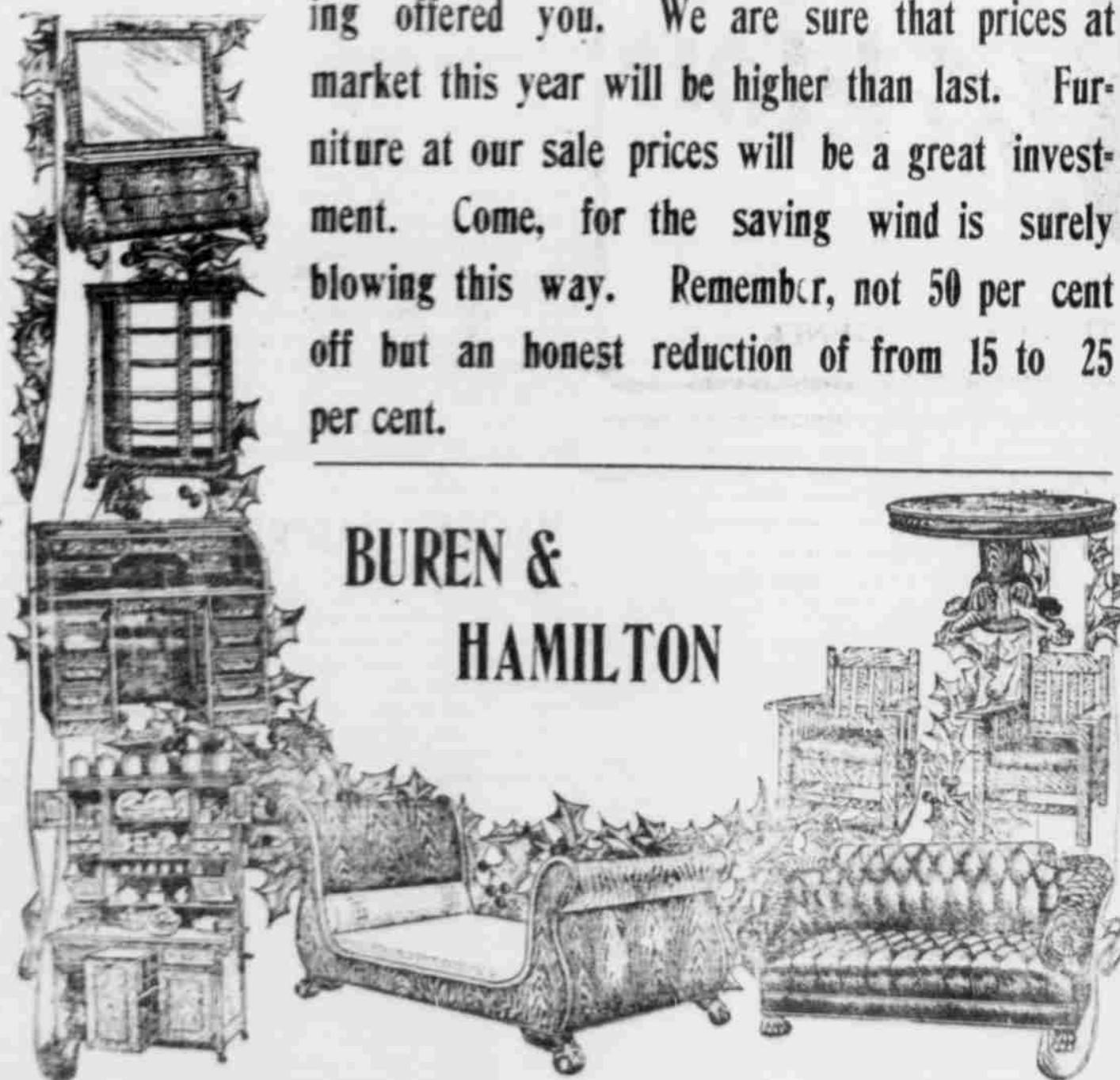

### LAST NIGHT COLDEST FOR SEVERAL YEARS

According to the local weather man's report, last night was the coldest of the season, the mercury going down to 12 1/2 degrees above zero, accompanied with 2 1/2 inches of snow in this city. The tempera-

ture did not recover from the low mark this morning, but held steadily down around the 13 mark. The northerly winds continue to hold and from information received from points north the indications of more snow and cold weather are favorable. Washington and Idaho are grasped in the cold weather snap-

with no signs of abatement. The Willamette river at this point now stands at 12 1/2 feet and still is rising slowly. The rise is caused by the heavy rainfall near Eugene and points south. The Santiam river, one of the wickedest little streams in Oregon, is at a stand still as the result of the extreme cold in the mountains. Eighteen inches of snow and quantities of ice cover the Stayton territory.

### Oiltanks Were Saved.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 8.—A fire which broke out early today in Benbow, a small town near Alton, Ill., and threatened to wipe out the town, was controlled today with a loss of \$40,000. Several persons were slightly injured. The fire did not reach the great Standard Oil tanks located there.

### HENEY PUTS GRAFT AT HARRIMAN'S DOOR
