 Attorney Keyes and Benson, for C. Y. Timmons, are now expecting to produce testimony in the trial Monday that Timmons is the victim of circumstances, rather than a common murderer.  A complaint was filed in the circuit court this morning by T. D. Jones against G. A. Walker, of Astoria, for a decree to prohibit the defendants from claiming any portion of certain property in the land claim of A. F. Walker. Attorney Keyes appears for the plaintiff in the case.

**Dead in Syracuse—**  
 G. M. Whipple, who lives on rural route No. 8, three miles east of Seaside, in the Astoria district, received a dispatch yesterday telling him of the death at Syracuse, N. Y., of his wife. The death occurred on Thursday, January 1. Mrs. Whipple went East in July, 1937, to visit her sister and other relatives. She was taken sick the day she arrived at Syracuse. For the past few months she has been improving, and was planning to return home to Oregon. She never regained sufficient strength for the journey. The particulars of the death have not yet been learned. There will be a memorial service at Auburn school house at 2 p. m. Sunday (tomorrow), January 18.

**Dismissed the Jury—**  
 Judge Barnett dismissed the jury today and adjourned court to meet again Monday at 9 o'clock.

**About Stry Hog—**  
 In the case of Christensen vs. Morgan, in which M. Christensen endeavored to eject D. Morgan from disposing of a band of logs belonging to Christensen, alleged to have been picked up on the road as stray property, the jury handed down a verdict in favor of D. Morgan.

**Down Towards Zero—**  
 The official weather registry showed four degrees above the little round mark at 8 o'clock this morning down at the O. C. T. Co. dock, but the blue mineral began climbing at 9 o'clock and reached the 11 mark where it remained in greater part of the morning. The ice on the sloughs thickened to near half an inch, but, owing to the blanket of snow covering it, skating is poor. Enough snow fell during the night to cover up the soiled spots.

**Five Coons, Two Foxes—**  
 Dan and Ed Boney, Salem's mighty Nimrods, "went out for to hunt" yesterday. They captured two foxes and five of those diminutive bears colloquially called "coons."
