MAYOR'S VETO MESSAGE OF ELECTRIC LINE FRANCHISE

Mayor Rodgers filed his message vetoing the electric line franchise Saturday night.

To the Common Council of the City of Salem:

Bill number 596 is returned herewith with my disapproval.

I have no objection to the bill save the portion in reference to the building of bridges, and I have striven to avoid disapproving it by securing the consent of the grantee to a separate contract covering the points of my objection, but the lapse of time makes it imperative that I take action on the bill in order to avoid its becoming a law by limitation.

Section 8 provides that the grantee shall pay such proportion of the cost of the superstructure of new bridges as "8 feet in width shall bear to the greatest width" of the bridge; and shall also pay for the stringers and ties under its track together with the decking immediately over its ties.

When the bill was first under consideration it was generally believed that a reinforced concrete bridge would be provided for South Commercial street. Had this been done the grantee's share of the cost under the terms of the bill, would have been, perhaps, an equitable share; but inasmuch as the council has preferred a wooden bridge 99 feet wide for this street to cost about \$6000, the grantee's share under the above terms would amount to but \$400 or \$500.

All our bridges, with the exception of the South Commercial street one, are narrow, and are likely to be so for many years. Insofar as the provision in question applies to them I think it reasonably equitable, but in the case of a wide bridge made so by the necessities of traffic and business, I think the provision inadequate.

The present South Commercial

street structure is 99 feet wide. It contains 120 piles between the north bank and the north edge of the new fill on the south bank. If this bill goes into effect and a new bridge similar to the present one is built in its place the grantee will be required to pay for but one-twelfth of the piling, or 10 piles and covering. If the company were to build its own bridge at that point, for railway only it would require about 40 piles.

The fact that a wide bridge takes care of a great deal of lateral stress with minimum amount of piling, makes it possible to build a street car bridge over one of them with but a small amount of piling under the track.

If this bill becomes a law the city will practically be required to pay for about two-thirds of the railway company's 8 feet of the construction of the South Commercial street bridge.

Gets Presidential Term—

Peery Made Able Plea—

One of the most intelligent pleas for leniency at the hands of Judge Burnett ever heard in this city was made this morning by W. O. Peery, who was tried and convicted at this term of court for obtaining money under false pretense. Peery stated his case to the court in a clear, straightforward manner asking clemency for a parole or a minimum sentence on the grounds that he had been confined in the city jail for six months. Judge Burnett apparently took Peery's excellent talk under consideration as he gave him the minimum sentence of one year. The

legal men who heard Peery's plea were much impressed with the manner in which he delivered it and many remarks were overheard highly praising his ability. When the judge read his sentence Peery was unmoved, and accepted the one year without a tremor.
