FREE LOCKS AND CANAL.

The cause represented by the above term is nearer to the pocket-books of the people of Western Oregon than any other reform.

A corporation sits at the gateway of Western Oregon and LEVIES TOLLS ON THEIR COMMERCE AND INDUSTRY.

This toll of 50 cents a ton on freight going up and down the Willamette river is also collected on all railroad freight.

A city like Eugene with 40,000 tons of freight in and out pays a tax of \$20,000 a year to the corporations SO LONG AS THE LOCKS AND CANAL ARE NOT MADE FREE.

A city like Salem with an annual river and rail tonnage of 100,000 tons pays \$50,000 a year tax to the corporation in the same way.

THE ABOLITION OF THIS ANTI-AND HOARY GRAFT IS OVERDUE.

The last legislature appropriated \$200,000 as a contingent sum to assist congress in purchasing the locks and canal at Oregon City, and maintaining them forever free by the federal government.

Free locks and canal mean \$15 to \$25 a car saved on all freight in and out of the Willamette valley, and nearly all Western Oregon.

MONTANA APPLE KING MAY COME TO SALEM

Captured a Silver Cup As Big As a Small Boy—Won Prizes with the McIntosh Variety—Say the Great Need of this Section Is Fruit Acreage.

Ben Kress, the apple king of Hamilton, Montana, with his wife and children are the guests of his brother, F. J. Kress and wife, at their home on East Twentieth and Cheneketa streets. Ben Kress is the proud possessor of a \$120 silver cup won at the Spokane Apple show. It is about two feet high and beautifully inscribed in his honor as prize-winner for a carload of apples grown and exhibited by him at the National Apple exposition held last month.

One can hardly call it a cup, but as it took a prize for a carload of apples of box-car size and big enough to water a horse out of. Mr. Kress also won a prize of 1000 apple boxes besides the big cup.

Mr. Kress is in the prime of life and very well preserved for a man who has endured the Montana climate for 20 years. It is a very hard climate. It is said hard drinkers go to Montana and forget to imbibe any more as they keep just deliciously full on the exhilarating climate all the time, although Mr. Kress was never bothered that way. He has been an apple grower for 13 years and has won a great reputation in that line. He has 35 acres of apples, one-third McIntosh and the rest mixed varieties. The McIntosh is a fancy seedling from the good old Eastern Snow apple of our boyhood days. A man in his right mind would rather eat a Snow apple than kiss a pretty girl, any day.

And the McIntosh has all the succulent charm of the Snow apple, with the pley fragrance of the Spitzenberg and the luscious, mouth-watering qualities of the Gravenstein. Besides getting that silver cup and the 1000 fruit boxes, Mr. Kress sold the carload of apples to a Chicago man at \$2.00 a box. If Mr. Kress could

sell out in Montana he would locate in the Willamette valley. He is a great booster for the Montana apple lands, says they are selling off readily at high prices, and that it is an ideal country to raise the Adam-begging product.

The Montana apple king is convinced that the Willamette valley has a great future for apples, pears and walnuts. He believes pears are a great coming crop, as Eastern pear orchards are dying out.

Mr. Kress says what this section needs is to put life into it is large plantings of fruit trees. Land should be laid off near this city by thousands of acres in apples, pears, walnuts, prunes, cherries, to sell in small tracts to home-seekers, who are coming here by the thousands, as Oregon fruit is advertising this state all over the world. The Board of Trade could not do better than to locate some man here with the life and "know" and enterprise of Mr. Kress, who would take a carload of our apples to the big Eastern shows, and show them what we can produce.

The only exhibits from Oregon at the Spokane apple show were from Hood River and Ontario. An apple grower in this section, with headquarters in this city, would be worth more to Salem than any line of boosting we know of.

Mr. Kress is not a handsome man, neither is his wife, but they are having a good time visiting the Kresses, and if he ever leaves Montana, and can put up with an occasional snow storm (three times in 20 years) Mr. and Mrs. Kress, the Apple King and Queen of Hamilton, Mont., would be a valuable acquisition to Marion county.

MOVEMENT FOR MOUNTAIN WATER MAKES HEADWAY

(From the Eugene Guard, Jan. 2.)

There are some persons in Eugene who profess to think the city council has done wrong in expending money for preliminary plans for a mountain water system. This is in marked contrast with the view taken by the people and press of Salem promises to become in a few years much for a live place like the Capital on the same subject. The movement to secure a mountain water system for Salem is gaining force and momentum with each passing day. The Salem city council has set its stamp of approval on the project by appropriating \$1500 to make the surveys and help with the preliminary work. The general committee of husters in charge of the work, headed by Mr. J. C. Perry, but that's not it is estimated now that the system by GOVERNOR GEO. E. CHAMBERLAIN is doing good work and there is not the least doubt but that at the proper time the state legislature will take the matter up and no doubt the state will do its share in providing funds to bring a plentiful supply of the purest mountain water to this city.
