SENATE RESOLUTIONS HELD UP BY SELLING

Senators to Have Each a Private Stenographer or Clerk in Addition to Those Provided by the Kuykendall Law.

In the senate, where Ben Selling refused to participate in the caucus, the first fall was taken out of the machine graft, when by a vote of 16 to 14 all joint investigation resolutions were sent to the committee on resolutions. Kay and Selling led the fight.

Senate Monday Afternoon.
Temporary president, Kay, called the senate at 2 p. m. and a permanent organization was effected with the election of the officers recommended by the Republican caucus. Judge F. A. Moore was invited before the senate to administer to the newly elected senators and officers the oath of office.

President Bowerman appointed J. W. Bones of Yamhill and Edward Corcoran, of Multnomah, as pages. A number of resolutions were presented calling forth considerable argument on the part of the members. Much opposition was made to the adoption of resolutions to appoint examinations committee.

S. R. 1.—Kay to provide for a committee of five on resolution. Adopted.

S. C. R.—Bingham to appoint committee to examine the books of the state treasurer. Carried. The vote was afterwards reconsidered and referred to committee on resolution.

S. J. R.—Cole to arrange for the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of Lincoln. Referred.

S. R. 2.—Bingham to authorize the secretary of state to furnish each member with \$6.50 worth of stamps and wrappers. Carried.

S. R. 3.—Miller of Linn to extend courtesy of senate to press. Carried.

S. R. 4.—Withdrawn.

S. R. 5.—Miller of Linn to open

session with prayer. Carried.

S. R. 6.—Miller of Linn to adopt senate rules of last session as temporary rules of this session. Adopted after lively debate.

S. C. R. 3.—Chase to appoint a committee to examine books of the state printer. Referred.

S. C. R. 4.—Hart, to appoint committee to examine blind school. After extended debate referred to resolution committee.

S. C. R. 5.—Beach, to examine books of secretary of state. Referred.

EARTHQUAKE IN ALASKA —SOUND CITIES SHAKEN

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 12.—Great apprehension is felt here today regarding what probable action may have resulted from the earthquake in Alaska, which was felt in this section late yesterday afternoon. The tilted States cable between Seattle and Sitka went out of commission shortly after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, an hour and a half before the quake was felt on Puget Sound.

It is believed that marine disturbances, a forerunner of the shocks, put the cable out of commission by swinging it against the sharp edges of rocks on which it rests in the straits of San Juan de Fuca near Cape Flattery, where the break is said to have occurred.

According to the seismograph record at the state university, the center of the shock must have been in southeastern Alaska. Juneau, Ketchikan, Skagway, Cordova, Valdez and Seward are important towns where great damage could have occurred. At Juneau, the largest mines in the world, the Treadwell group, are located, and if the shock caused slides or cave-ins, scores would have been killed. Many of the places are situated but a few feet above the sea level and a tidal wave would have swept them out of existence. Many Alaskans believe that Mount St. Elias has broken forth or some of the smaller supposed extinct volcanoes along the Aleutian chain have suddenly become active.

The shocks in Seattle lasted for seven minutes and 30 seconds. The first started at 3:50 and continued almost without interruption. Reports from all sections of the state advise that the shocks caused the greatest alarm. People fled from their buildings in the greatest apprehension. In the sky-scrapers of Seattle the scenes resulting from the shock were exciting, indeed. Elevators refused to work their grooves being brown out of plumb. The occupants of the various offices rushed from the streets. Books were shaken from shelves and hanging fixtures moved in a most uncanny manner. No particular damage, however, has been reported.
