THE GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

Every word of Governor Chamberlain's message received the closest attention from the large audience assembled at the state capitol on Tuesday.

The message was a clear and wholesome state paper, devoid of sensationalism and TAINTED BY NO WORD OF DEMAGOGUISM.

The message showed a clear grasp of the vital public issues that are uppermost in the affairs of this commonwealth.

The governor's ability as a lawyer, shown especially in his INTERPRETATIONS OF THE CONSTITUTION.

For as a Democrat he believes in a broad and liberal construction of that document and the powers that can be exercised under its provisions.

Notable evidences of this tendency were shown by his championing of A LARGER NUMBER OF JUSTICES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

He takes broad and progressive views on educational matters, as evidenced by his endorsement of three well maintained normal schools TO PROVIDE WELL-TRAINED TEACHERS FOR THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

His vigorous advocacy of the free locks and canal at Oregon City goes so far as to demand that the contingent appropriation made by the last legislature be continued.

In the event of failure by the delegation in congress to secure the necessary appropriation, Governor Chamberlain demands that the state MAKE THE LOCKS FREE WITHOUT WAITING FOR CONGRESS.

The governor fearlessly declares it is the duty of the legislature to elect the choice of the people to the United States senate.

He does not mince matters nor play petty politics BECAUSE HE WILL BE THE BENEFICIARY OF THEIR ACTION.

The message is earnest, serious and businesslike in every line. Above all, there is not a word of excuse or apology for any graft, but A CLEAR AND VIGOROUS DEFENSE OF POPULAR MEASURES.

The message will compare favorably with any similar state paper of other states, and Oregon has reason to be proud of her chief executive.

THE FIGHT AGAINST THE GRAFTS.

Ordinarily there is a minority in every legislative body that fights the grafts that originate with the majority.

In the present legislature there has so far appeared no formidable opposition TO ANY FORM OF PREDATORY SPOILIATION.

The codes, the stamps, the clerkships, the investigating committees, all go through with a maddening rush that makes taxpayers dizzy.

There is usually a leadership developed right at the start that holds up some of the MULTITUDINOUS ENTERPRISES OF GRAFT.

But so far neither Republican nor Democrat has appeared who is a match for the organized raid on the treasury that is planned.

In the present legislature the plight of the taxpayer is more deplorable because there have been NO PROFESSIONS OF REFORM BY ANY LEADER.

So far not a single demand for anything in the way of perquisites has been denied or turned down or even held up with a roll call.
