**LOCKS AND CANAL BILL TO BE EXTENDED**

The house bill for an act extending the time in which the United States shall be entitled to the money appropriated by chapter 95, laws 1907, to aid it in acquiring by purchase, condemnation or construction a boat canal and locks at Oregon City.

Whereas, by chapter 95, laws of 1907, there was appropriated the sum of \$300,000 out of funds to be raised as in said act provided, to be paid to the United States for the purpose of assisting it in acquiring by purchase, condemnation or construction, a boat canal and locks at Oregon City, to be owned and controlled by the United States, for the free passage of boats navigating the river on the condition that the United States shall, within three years from the date of the passage of such act, appropriate the sum of \$300,000, or a sum sufficient for the purpose stated,

Whereas, the time in which the United States can accept such offer and appropriation is about to expire, therefore,

Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

Section 1. That the provisions of chapter 95, laws of 1907, entitled "An act appropriating \$300,000, contingent upon the United States appropriating the sum of \$300,000, or a sum sufficient to acquire by purchase, condemnation or construction of a boat canal and locks around the falls of the Willamette River at Oregon City, Oregon, and rights of way and property necessary or convenient therefor, and to be owned, maintained and operated by the United States," and the offer to the United States contained therein be, and the same is hereby extended until the 1st day of March, 1911; provided, however, that the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, in estimating the amount of money to be raised by taxation for said purpose, shall not include any sum for the purpose stated in said act, after the year 1910, but the several amounts required to be levied and collected by section 3 of said act, shall be and remain available, until the date hereinafter stated, for the purpose for which the same was levied and collected, notwithstanding the provisions of section 4 of said act.

**CALIFORNIA TO PASS ANTI-JAPANESE LAWS**

Sacramento, Jan. 13.—That a request from President Roosevelt to abstain from anti-Japanese legislation will not meet the legislature's acquiescent reception of two years ago, was indicated today by Assemblyman Grove L. Johnson. Johnson declared that he would use every endeavor to secure the passage of legislation leveled against the Japanese and would not be deterred by Roosevelt or threats from Washington. "I will not be turned aside by President Roosevelt or anyone else,"

said Johnson. "Two years ago Roosevelt sent a telegram to the governor asking suspension of further action in regard to the bills against the Japanese and I acquiesced in the request. This time I will stand firm and fight for the passage of my bills." Three bills introduced by Johnson provide segregation in public schools, the prevention of Japanese becoming directors in corporations, and allowing cities to establish Oriental quarters for Japanese.

**EARTHQUAKE IN ALASKA DID LITTLE DAMAGE**

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 13.—According to dispatches received from Alaska cities today by the United Press only two northern towns felt the earthquake shock of Monday afternoon. A wireless received at Nome from St. Michael stated that at 3 o'clock a shock lasting 15 seconds was followed by one of seven seconds duration. The movement appeared to be from west to east. No damage was reported.

A Ketchikan a slight shock was felt shortly after three o'clock. Fairbanks, in the interior, felt no earth movements. At Juneau, Valdez and Douglas the first intimation that an earthquake shock had occurred was when press dispatches were received asking if the towns were still

on the map or whether they had slid into the sea.

The dispatch from Nome bears out the theory that it is believed that some extinct volcano on the Aleutian Islands may have become active. There is great relief in this section by Alaskans that their friends and relatives in the north are safe. When the United States Cable went out of commission and delays were experienced securing answers to inquiries sent over the Dominion government wires the gravest fears were entertained that some calamity had occurred in Alaska.

The cable ship Burnside started today for Cape Flattery, where grappling will begin for the loose ends of the cable. Tests show that several breaks have resulted from the earthquake.

**MEDFORD WENT WET AT TUESDAY'S ELECTION**

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Medford, Or., Jan. 13.—Medford woke up today to find herself lined up with the "wets" as the result of yesterday's election at which the prohibitionists received a shock through their defeat, because they felt certain of victory.

It was one of the liveliest elections ever held here.

A total of 926 votes were cast. W. H. Canno being elected mayor. Prohibition was defeated by 127 majority. The attempt to amend the charter to make it comply with the local option law was defeated also.

**THE DALLES KEPT GAY BY BURSTING PIPES**

(United Press Leased Wire.)

The Dalles, Or., Jan. 13.—Bursting water pipes are holding the citizens of The Dalles in a nervous state of apprehension, as they know not when their homes may be wrecked.

The latest bursting of water pipes, due to the cold weather, occurred in the home of State Senator Nick Sinnott yesterday.

The big range in his kitchen was blown apart and one of the lids is now located in the ceiling. A window was blown out and dishes broken. Mrs. Sinnott's escape from injury cannot be explained as she was standing three feet from the stove when the explosion occurred. Similar explosions have happened lately in four or five homes.

**HUNDREDS OF HOMELESS GIRLS ARE MARRIED**

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Naples, Jan. 13.—While the Italian government and those of foreign countries are pouring in money and supplies for the relief of the Sicilian and Calabrian earthquake sufferers, the workmen of this and other cities by hundreds are marrying young girls orphaned by the disaster, according to the authorities today.

Hundreds of unmarried workmen have attested that they will provide homes for homeless girls, whose parents perished in the destruction of Southern Sicily. Many marriages have been performed, and scores of others are announced. In all cases, the girls are over 16, as required by law.

The marriages in most cases followed after a few hours' acquaintance on the part of the principals. The advertisements are being quickly answered and little delay occurs in performing the ceremony.

So many marriages have taken place authorities have been called upon to make an investigation for the purpose of preventing the destitute girls and young women from falling into the power of unscrupulous persons.

**SHE CAN SIT ON HIS LAP AND KISS HIM GOOD NIGHT**

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Cleveland, O., Jan. 13.—Judge A. Adams reiterated today that he would constantly refuse to issue warrants for the arrest of young women who sat upon their fiancés' knees despite parental objection.

The judge's decision follows his refusal yesterday afternoon to accommodate an irate parent with a warrant for the arrest of his daughter for what he termed a heinous offense.

"I want to teach her a lesson," cried the angry man to the judge. "I found her sitting on his knee, and when I ordered him from the house he had the audacity to kiss her good night—before my eyes."

The court declared that there was no law against the action of the young lady, and declined to interfere.

**STEAMER WRECKED ON CALIFORNIA COAST**

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco Jan. 13.—Word was received here today that the steamer wrecked near Rock Point north of Point Conception last night was the Sybil Marston, lumber laden from Grays Harbor for San Pedro.

Two men were drowned. One body has been recovered. The Marston is a 647-ton vessel and carried a crew of 21 men with Captain Bjelinski. She was built a year and a half ago, and carried 1,100,000 feet of lumber.

News of the wreck was first learned through reports from coast points, where her distress whistles were heard during the night. Details of the accident are not known.

Santa Barbara, Cal., Jan. 13.—Two men are dead and the lives of 21 others are in grave danger on the wrecked steam schooner Sybil Marston which is being dashed to pieces on the rocks a mile south of the town of Surf, near Point Arguello light today, after going aground at 10:30 o'clock last night.

Two men were drowned last night while attempting to reach the shore through the surf, and Captain Bjelinski and 20 members of the crew are still aboard the doomed vessel, all efforts to rescue them having proved futile, according to advices received here.

Surf, Cal., Jan. 13.—Rigging a line from the beach to the wrecked steam schooner Sybil Marston this afternoon, lifesavers rescued the captain and members of the crew who remained aboard the doomed vessel, after two sailors had lost their lives trying to swim through the surf. The dead men's names were McCarthy and O'Neil. One body has been recovered.

The Marston is aground a mile from here, off Sandy Beach. Her pilot said he mistook the lights at the depot here for Arguello light house.

There is ten feet of water in the hold of the Marston and practically no hope of saving her. Her cargo can probably be salvaged.
