Are You One of Them? The housewife who has been induced to buy a phosphate baking powder by grocers or canvassers will be somewhat chagrined to learn that this character of goods is made from burned bones mixed with diluted oil of vitrol.

It seems that there is no law compelling these long-shot boys to print the ingredients on the can, and hence the consumer is easily deceived. Goods of this class cost very little to manufacture—about 3 or 4 cents per pound not much more than the price of the bone or alum from which they are made.

Ice in the Mill Ditch— The present freeze is working a hardship on the mill ditch people in this city by clogging up the race with ice, to the extent that it requires careful watching to prevent serious trouble. The Salem Water Company is running their steam pump to retain a reasonable pressure of water. The Salem Woolen Mill Company is also put out of business as the result of the cold snap.

Mrs. W. W. Ferrier Dead— Word has been received in this city of the death of Mrs. W. W. Ferrier, wife of the editor of The Pacific, the Congregational church paper of this coast, in San Francisco, last Saturday night. The remains were laid to rest on Monday afternoon. Mrs. L. G. Altman, wife of Dr. Altman, of this city, is a sister of the deceased and has been caring for her for the past two weeks.

Funds for Italy— The Italian relief fund will probably be sent on its way today by Dr. W. H. Byrd chairman of the committee. Dr. Byrd cannot state at present the exact total of the fund but thinks it will be in the neighborhood of \$300. Various amounts are yet to be collected. The committee has decided to turn the money over to the Red Cross Association as that organization is considered the most dependable and convenient to correspond with.

Cleaning Out the Jail— The county jail is becoming less popular every day during the present term of court. Every criminal brought before the court this term has been dealt with by the state in a speedy manner and conviction has resulted in all. First came Black, who got 10 years for shooting Dr. Charles Robertson; then Yashita, the Jap, who was deported; W. O. Peery came next with a one-year sentence, and Adams followed with a presidential term. All of these convicts are already wearing stripes. After the Timmons trial is finished, there will remain but three prisoners under the care of Sheriff Min-to.

Went Through the Ice— While skating on the slough at the mouth of Mill creek yesterday afternoon Romeo Gouley a prominent Salem hop man, broke through the ice, and had it not been for the quick assistance of Milo Rasmussen, an employe of the O. C. T. Co., he would have probably been frozen or drowned. His comrades made several attempts to help him by throwing planks to him, but Gouley could not manage to crawl out on them. Rasmussen, seeing the trouble hurried to Gouley's assistance with a long rope, which he threw to him, and by the aid of a steady pull was able to climb on the board thrown him, and gave solid ice. As it was he had a close call and a decidedly cold bath.

Eyre Is Captain— The high school football team held a short meeting last night and elected Charles Eyre as captain of the 1933 team. Eyre is a member of the 1911 class and has a good reputation in athletics.

Glee Club Organized— The Y. M. C. A. glee club has organized and the election of officers for the year is as follows: Director and manager, Will Ketchum; president, Walter Minor; vice-president, E. L. Pittman; secretary and treasurer, H. Dause. The annual meeting was held last evening, when matters pertaining to the development of the club were discussed.

Club Meeting Postponed— On account of conflicting dates the East Salem Push Club, which was to meet Wednesday, the 13th, has been postponed until Friday, January 15, at 8 o'clock p. m. The purpose of the meeting is to complete the work of organization begun Wednesday of last week. This meeting will be of vast interest to all, and everyone is cordially invited. The meeting will not be held at the Ch-m'keta street church, as formerly announced, but will be held in the congregational church, corner of Nineteenth and Perry streets.

Weather Is Moderating— At last the weather gauge at the local bureau shows the temperature to be considerably warmer. Last night the mercury went only a few degrees below zero and this morning it went sailing up to 13 in a short time. The wind is steadily veering toward the north, and the sky shows a tendency to brighten up a bit.

POMPADOUR JIM THINKS HE CAN DOWN JOHNSON

Chicago Jan. 13.—James J. Corbett today modestly believes he is the only man in the world who can walk off with the heavyweight honors, now held by Johnson. Duseissing the situation, Corbett said: "Al Kubiak, the big Polish fighter from Michigan looms up as a possibility, but that is all. It will take a couple of years to bring him around to a point where he will be taken seriously. I have talked to a couple of the ring fans who have watched the development of Kubiak closely, but they can see no future for him yet. He is a big, strong fellow, and would give any of the second-class men a tough argument, but compared to Johnson he is several notches below par.

"The fighting world is (about) of the opinion that it will take some one better than the present crop of fighters to whip Johnson. In the interest of the game, and for the sake of the white man's cause, I have been approached on the matter myself. I am out of the fighting game, but I am afraid if some one don't meet Johnson, I may."

EARTHQUAKE SHAKES ALL NORTHERN ITALY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Rome, Jan. 13.—All Tuscany and many cities in northern Italy were shaken by a severe earthquake this morning and vague reports of heavy damage in the larger cities have been received. At Genoa the shock was so heavy that the people rushed out of their houses and would not return for hours. Other cities affected were Milan, Lombardi, Venice and Padua in

Venetia and Florence in Tuscany. Later reports indicate that the shock was more severe than was reported at first. No reports of deaths have been received and the details are meager. Later reports from Tuscany showed that the property damage consisted of the collapse of a few houses and a general cracking of walls in the various cities. Several cathedrals were damaged.

Board of Trade Meeting— The Board of Trade will hold its annual meeting this evening, and new officers will be elected. Reports for the year will also be filed and acted upon.

East School Opened— The East school opened again this morning after a discontinuance of three days on account of the cold weather which was so severe to permit the conducting of school. All other schools in the city have been in operation.

Institute Postponed— County School Superintendent Smith has decided to postpone the proposed institute for schools, to be held at Turner next Saturday, until the 20th of this month. He made this change owing to the inclement weather which is too severe to permit January the snow would be practically gone.

Rather Look Out Than In— The register at the city jail this morning credited four men with being drunk and disorderly. Two of the occupants were in a hilarious condition last night and continued to make things hum until the officers put a stop to further mischief. Nevertheless the prisoners have no personal grievance against the police for arresting them as they stated this morning they would rather be on the inside looking out than on the outside looking in.

Some "Flub-Dub" Skaters— Yesterday evening several Eastern people were skating on the pond across from the O. C. T. Co. and, notwithstanding that a few had not been on ice skates for six or seven years, they could cut the curves, writes names and also "makes stars" in a beautiful manner. A first-class exhibition was given by J. L. Kols, a traveling salesman. Kola cut swatches of holly and big pansies with apparent ease and his ability as a fast skater was well demonstrated. Several high jumping contests were also pulled off and on the opposite side of the wire the ice was full of stars and rainbows, caused by the inexperienced high jumper.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles Cal. Jan. 13.—Accused of robbing 12 safes and holding up more than 50 people, three men suspected of being the criminals who have been terrorizing Los Angeles and vicinity recently, are under arrest today. The men are entered at the police station as Charles Mavin, alias Britt; T. E. Garwood, alleged to have been a convict five times, and Jimmy Fifer, alleged ex-convict and expert safe cracker.

When they were arrested the men were alleged to have been planning to crack a safe in the New Majestic theatre. Nitro-glycerine, believed to have been hidden by the trio, was found behind a bill board across the street from the theatre.

FLATHEAD INDIANS IN STARVING CONDITION

(United Press Leased Wire.) Helena, Mont., Jan. 13.—Hundreds of members of the Flathead Indian tribe on the Flathead reservation are said to be practically without food and in immediate danger of starving to death unless relief is offered. Fred C. Morgan, superintendent of the reservation, will at once request the government to give the Indians some assistance until they can be removed to another reservation. Many of the tribe's horses are dead and others must be killed, as there is nothing for them to eat. Superintendent Morgan is making an effort to get forage from Fort Harrison for the Indians' ponies.

WILL NOT SUICIDE UNLESS HE CAN BURN

(United Press Leased Wire.) Marshfield, O r. Jan. 13.—In the person of Sefana Orcheoni an Italian, the police of Marshfield have a queer character. Sefana says he does not care to live but will not take his life unless he is permitted to leap into flames. He attempted to fire a sawmill and attacked the watchman with an axe. After he was landed in jail he tried to start a blaze in his cell.
