TILLMAN NOT CHARGED WITH VIOLATING LAW

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, Jan. 14.—It is not expected that Senator Tillman's request that the senate investigate the charges made against him by the President in connection with the Oregon land deals. No member of the committee on privileges and elections can be found who is willing to ask for the investigation. Those senators who have discussed the matter say they can see no question before the senate, except as to whether Tillman was frank with his colleagues in his discussion of the deal.

Even if the charges made by the President are true, it is said, there was no violation of the law. Therefore, it is not likely that there will be any investigation unless Tillman, himself, insists upon it, and his friends will advise him against such action.

MURDER WAS SCHEME TO COLLECT INSURANCE

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Burlington, Ia., Jan. 14.—That life insurance companies will refuse to pay Mrs. Carmichael widow of the minister who murdered Gideon Browning, an Adair carpenter, in a little Methodist church at Columbus, Mich., on the theory that the murder was a part of her husband's plot to commit suicide, so that she might recover the money, is the belief of Sheriff Moore, of Port Huron, Mich., today. Moore passed through here on his way to Michigan with the body of Carmichael.

Moore declared emphatically that Carmichael killed Browning to give the impression that he himself was the victim, so that his wife might collect the insurance. The sheriff refused to divulge what reasons led to his conclusion but asserted that

investigation had convinced him that such was the case.

A hypodermic syringe was found on Carmichael, and needle scars on his body attested his use of a drug.

To Show Us Webfeet.

Portland, Or., Jan. 14.—Ormsby McHarg, personal representative of Chairman Frank Hitchcock, in the last presidential campaign, is in Portland for the sole purpose, it is reported, of leading the fight for the election of a Republican senator, instead of Governor Chamberlain, Democrat, and the people's choice.

When McHarg heard a rumor that money would be used to defeat Chamberlain he quickly denied it so far as the national administration is concerned. How he will induce 52 legislators to repudiate the pledged upon which they were elected is not revealed, but this is his mission.

It is said he will use the argument a Republican legislature and Oregon owe it to their own interests and to the national administration to send a Republican, and not a Democrat, to the United States senate. It is apparent to Governor Chamberlain and his adherents that McHarg is here at the behest of Senator Fulton, whose seat the governor will occupy if elected, and, with the sanction of the Republican organization and President-elect Taft.

However, Fulton denies that Hitchcock's man is here to argue in his behalf, and adds that he is principally concerned in seeing a Republican elected, not being particular who that Republican is. Although McHarg has been in Oregon only a few hours, he has been a busy man, holding conferences with the politicians opposed to Chamberlain's election.

The next most important move before the senatorial election will be the confab to be held on the eve of that event by McHarg and Senators Coffey and Miller and Representatives McCue and Mahoney, who are the front of the anti-Chamberlainites. McHarg expects to leave this state after the first ballot is taken in the legislature.
