Building Collapsed—
A small building at the intersection of State and Liberty streets collapsed last evening from being overloaded with wet snow and ice. There resulted no damage from the wreck, as it was an unused structure.

New Jury List—
Some 300 names were selected by the county commissioners which will make up the jury list for the year. The names are yet to be carefully gone over by the commissioners and all exempt parties removed from the list. The names will be copied and ready for publication by tomorrow.

Sues for Legal Fees—
A suit to recover fees on legal work has been filed in the circuit court by W. H. Holmes against Henry Carmody. The complaint alleges that Carmody received services from Holmes amounting to the sum of \$750, but so far has paid only \$150, leaving \$600 yet unpaid, for which amount Holmes asks the court to give him judgment. The legal work done for Carmody was carried on in the supreme and circuit courts.

Wood Alcohol Killed Him—
As the result of becoming heavily intoxicated with wood alcohol yesterday morning, Thomas Daly, a convict at the state penitentiary, died in agony in spite of every effort of Prison Physician J. D. Shaw and House Steward Wm. Quartier. Coroner Clough was notified later of the unfortunate prisoner's death and he conducted an investigation resulting a verdict that Daly died from excessive use of wood alcohol. G. C. Bellinger, Fred H. Thompson, J. C. Bartlett, J. C. Russell, Walter C. Smith and A. L. Windot made up the jurors selected to decide the matter and they found no blame attached to the officials at the penitentiary as Daly procured the alcohol under the pretense that he was going to use it in the nickel polishing room. Daly is 38 years of age and was committed to the penitentiary from Wasco county February 2, convicted on the charge of perjury.

Wants a New Deal—

The first divorce proceedings filed in department No. 2 of the circuit court for this month, was entered today by Nina Prinzler against George Prinzler on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. The complaint alleges that Prinzler, shortly after he married the plaintiff commenced treating her in a cruel and inhuman manner by berating her, and later he left her alone at their home in a sickly condition, with no care, and went to Albany and Corvallis, where he associated with other women. Mrs. Prinzler asks the court to decree her an absolute divorce. Attorneys Weatherford & Wyatt appear for the plaintiff in the case.

Says House Was Open—

The circuit court was busy today with the suit of S. E. Peck vs. Julius G. Voget, an action for money instigated by Peck on the grounds that Voget, in erecting a cottage for him, failed to abide by the contract and plans upon which the building was to be constructed. Peck alleges that Voget, in building the house, left large cracks in the walls and doors, through which rains could beat in and cold winds blow, and that the structure was not capable of protecting an occupant suitably. Carson & Brown appear as counsel for Peck, while Carey F. Martin is attorney for the defendant.

Senate Furniture—

When the senators take their seats Monday they will occupy beautiful new desks that comport with senatorial dignity. Each desk is finished in mahogany from the Philippines, and has seven drawers. New chairs are also furnished, not quite so tippy as the old ones, and enabling a senator, when so disposed, to put his feet on top of the desk without danger of breaking his neck. There is also a place to lay his pipe and keep a few matches and tobacco. The house will get along with the old dinky desks with one drawer, and locks that half the time need a skilled burglar to get them open.

Say He Kept the Funds—

A complaint has been filed in the justice of the peace court by District Attorney John H. McNary against Rev. D. S. Walker, accusing him of the crime of larceny by bailment. The complaint alleges that on the 11th day of May, 1908, Walker, as agent for the Willamette University endowment fund, had in his possession the sum of \$100, which was the right property of Willamette University, and that Walker converted the amount to his own use and benefit. Walker was arrested by Constable Ira Hamilton yesterday morning, but, owing to the defendant being confined to his home with sickness, he was unable to appear before Judge Webster, and he is now under bond in the sum of \$750.

Curtis Company Wins—

After deliberating for a short time yesterday afternoon, the jury found a verdict in favor of the Curtis Lumber Co., which was sued by S. J. Burroughs for damages as the result of Burroughs becoming entangled in some of the machinery belonging to the Curtis Company in their mills at Mills City. The court held that no damages could be obtained from the lumber company, where the plaintiff showed contributory negligence, which was proven in testimony to the jury. Judge Burnett took up considerable time in instruction of the jury, as to what points to consider, and many important legal matters were a part of his instructions. Burroughs was seeking damages in the sum of \$20,000 for injuries incurred while working in the sawmill at Mills City, as ailer. This case was before the circuit court heretofore, but, owing to the jury failing to agree, it was again brought to issue this term.

FARMERS MUST FIGHT BOTH RATS AND MICE

A special dispatch from Washington says: Field mice destroy crops on hundreds of acres of land every year, and in the centers of population the ravages of rats entail a direct loss of \$20,000,000 annually. In addition, the rat excites grave apprehension because of its agency in distributing the dreaded plague and other diseases. Investigations conducted by the department of agriculture and the marine hospital service have prompted the authorities to send out a warning against field mice and house rats.

Although losses by field mice have proved a steady drain on the resources of American farmers and nurserymen, yet only occasionally, and over limited areas has the damage been so great as to attract attention. The extent of the destruction of crops by mice in the United States has never even approached that in Europe, where they have overrun whole provinces, leaving ruin in their wake. During the past year, however, a native species infected the alfalfa fields in Humboldt valley, Nevada, in such multitudes as to destroy nearly the whole crop.

Alfalfa Destroyed.

Out of the 29,000 acres of alfalfa in the valley, 15,000 acres were a total loss, so that the fields had to be replowed and reseeded. During the past year the biological survey sent two assistants to Nevada for the purpose of conducting experiments and demonstrating to the ranchmen the best methods of destroying the pesky rodents.

As a result of trials with various poisons it was found that sulphate of strychnine on chopped green alfalfa, or when that is not procurable, on alfalfa hay, is a most effective poison. Even on ranches where the number of field mice reach the astonishing total of 12,000 to the acre, relief was obtainable by careful and systematic poisoning, at the cost of only 70c per acre. By means of the combined efforts of the farmers of the valleys, using methods devised by the survey, the number of mice was finally so greatly reduced that hawks and owls, gulls, herons, ravens, skunks, badgers, weasels, foxes and coyotes, which had assembled early in the outbreak and killed at least 45,000 mice a day, were able to take care of the remainder and prevent them from doing serious damage, thus furnishing an important object lesson as to the usefulness of these destroyers of rodents when permitted to do the work they are fitted by nature to perform.

HUSBAND AND WIFE ARRESTED FOR MURDER

Ogallala, Neb., Jan. 15.—Lafayette Dale and Mrs. Jennie Geiger, claiming to be Dale's wife, were held to trial today charged with murdering Volly Mann and burying his body in a ravine near here. The crime was committed some months ago, but was not discovered until December of last year. Dale was arrested in Denver and brought to this city.

Sent to Pen Quickly.

Pittsburg, Jan. 15.—Less than an hour after the jury found J. B. F. Rinehart guilty of looting the Farmers' and Drovers' National Bank at Waynesburg, of over \$1,000,000, he was sentenced by Judge Jones to 15 years in the western penitentiary.

WASHINGTON ROADS THREATENED BY FLOODS

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 15.—The heavy rain which began last evening and continued to fall today, accompanied by the melting of the great amount of snow, has caused grave apprehension on the part of railroad officials here and serious washouts and snow slides are expected should the rain continue for 24 hours longer.

Northern Pacific railroad officials report that snow is falling heavily in the Cascades today, but state that they are so far successful in keeping the line clear. If the present warm weather continues, however, the railroads will be confronted with a serious situation, as the melting snow and rain has already caused mountain streams to become swollen and great volumes of water are being sent down to the valleys.
