property. Veto sustained.

H. B. No. 167, to amend sections

of code relating to registration. Veto

sustained.

H. B. No. 245, relating to partner-

ships being filed with county clerk.

Veto sustained.

H. B. No. 254, relating to election

of state printer at \$4000 per annum.

Veto sustained.

H. B. No. 260, creating First Central

Oregon fair.

Mr. Belknap and Mr. McCue and

Mr. Brooke spoke for the bill. Jones

of Douglas opposed the bill. The

noes were Brandon, Campbell, Lib-

by, Hattburg, Berdillon, Philpot,

Jones of Douglas, Purdin, Miller.

Ayes 49, noes 9, absent 2.

1917. McCue and Bean argued for

the bill, which the governor had

vetoed because of defective title of bill,

citing authorities. Passed over veto.

H. B. 432, to build auditorium at

Champoeg at site of organizing pro-

visional government. Veto sus-

tained.

juries.
