one of the great commonwealths of the nation.

I promise you my best efforts to assist in the improvement of the waterways of our state, and to secure the active co-operation of Democrats and Republicans alike in the senate of the United States to accomplish this result. The conservation of our natural resources (and Oregon in this respect is the richest state in the Union) and the reclamation of our semi-arid regions will all be matters which will have my heartiest support. I agree with Democrats and Republicans alike, who feel that there should be a revision of the tariff laws of the country. This is not, in my opinion, a political, but an economic and revenue question and in respect to the revision thereof, I propose to treat it, and the welfare of the people of my state, as affected by the tariff will be with me first consideration.

It would be improper for me at this time to make an extended address, I simply repeat to you what I have said before in my public addresses, that, though a Democrat, and adhering to fundamental principles, I place principle above party, my country, and my state above all else, and party lines will rest lightly on my shoulders. I assure you, wherever any question arises as to what is best for the people whose servant I am.

H. J. R. No. 4, by McArthur, to amend article 4, constitution, by adding section one, that no defeated amendment shall be again submitted for eight years.

H. J. R. No. 5, by Eaton, that ways and means committee print statement of annual appropriations.

H. J. M. No. 1, by Libby, to divert receipts from Forest Reserve be placed in educational funds.

H. J. M. No. 2, by Merryman, asking congress to repeal duties on sacking, for relief of grain growers.

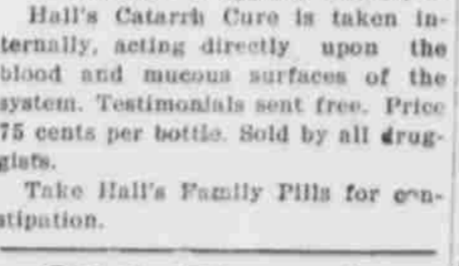

CLOSING CEREMONIES OF INAUGURATION

The formal inauguration ceremonies of Rev. Fletcher Homan, S. T. B. D. D., as president of Willamette university took place at the first Methodist church this morning at 10 o'clock. Bishop Charles W. Smith, of Portland, presiding.

The program opened with a pipe organ number by Professor Mendenhall of the college of music. A prayer was offered followed by a second selection by Prof. Mendenhall.

Bishop Edwin H. Hughes, D. D., L. L. D., of San Francisco, delivered the charge to the president very ably. His remarks were characteristic of one who has had a great deal of personal experience in the presidency of a great university. In closing he gave a short charge to the students.

President Homan's address was on the subject of "John Wesley, and the Development of Christian Education." He was given the most careful attention by the large audience, and at the close the university students joined in an enthusiastic yell for "Homan."

Trustees of the university were seated on the rostrum, and the front portion of the chapel was reserved for the students and members of the faculty.

This closed the inaugural ceremonies and the exercises in connection with them. They have been significant in many ways, and have awakened interest in Oregon's oldest educational institution "Willamette."

Yesterday afternoon the Alumni and friends of the university met, in the church parlors, and extended greetings to President Homan. The speakers were: Prof. Matthews, Representative Carter, of Hood River, Mr. Selwood and Hon. C. B. Moores.

Judge Robert Eakin introduced the speakers. Miss Seley, and Miss Theo. Bennett, delighted the audience with piano solos.

Last night Bishop Charles W. Smith occupied the pulpit.
