JONES PLEADS FOR INDIAN WAR VETERANS DEMANDS STATE MAKE PAYMENT OF A JUST DEBT

The chairman of the committee on Indian Affairs, to whom was referred house bill No. 9, begs leave to make the following minority report: that the bill do pass for the following reasons:

That in 1856, the legislative assembly of the territory of Oregon by an act entitled "An Act to provide for paying the volunteers in the service of the territory, and for the prosecution of the existing Indian war," undertook and agreed to pay the said volunteers and members of the Ninth regiment of Oregon militia, while engaged in active service, in said war by using the following language in section 4 of said act to-wit:

Section 4. "Whenever said volunteers are called and received into the service of the territory by virtue of this act each non-commissioned officer and private shall be entitled to receive two dollars per day and rations and two dollars per day for the use and risk of his horse except that horses actually killed in action unavoidably lost or reported unfit for service and turned over to the quartermaster, in which case the owner shall receive the appraised value thereof and all commissioned officers shall receive the same pay as officers of the same rank in the army of the United States; provided, that commissioned officers shall receive the same pay for horses as non-commissioned officers."

Section 2 of said act follows, to-wit:

"Said volunteers shall, as far as practicable, furnish their own arms and clothing, horses and equipments."

These Indian War Veterans, relying on the honesty and good faith of the territorial government, and in

order to preserve and protect the settlers from the depredations and murderous assaults of the Indians, left their homes and firesides, their wives and children in their log cabins unprotected, and went to the front, furnishing their own horses and equipments, performed heroic services for their country, and laid the foundation for one of the grandest states in the Union, and now, after a lapse of over half a century, when the great majority of these grand old pioneers are sleeping beneath the evergreen sod of this favored country that they redeemed from the howling savages; when only a few of these gray-haired state-builders come to an Oregon legislature, not begging, not asking for charity, only asking that their long neglected claims be allowed. I do not believe that, after due consideration, any member of this house will vote against this bill.

A senator once stated in this building that an honest debt was never outlawed, and, while the statutes of limitation may have run on the claims of these old Indian War Veterans, it is a just debt, and we cannot honestly repudiate it.

It was a sacred promise, and must not be violated. It was only yesterday, upon the floor of this house, that a number of the representatives said that they had given a sacred pledge to the sovereign people of the state of Oregon, and that they would redeem that pledge, although it was against their wishes.

I call upon these, and all other representatives, to redeem the pledge made by the pioneer legislatures in the days that are gone by, and ask them to vote to pay these old gray-haired veterans, and thus redeem the honor and fair name of Oregon.

APPEAL TAKEN IN THE FINCH CASE

Judge Bronough, of the circuit court of Multnomah county, yesterday overruled Finch's petition for a new trial, and notice of appeal was at once filed by his attorney. A bill of exceptions has been filed, but has not yet been settled. This will probably be done today, as Finch will be brought to the prison here unless this is done. Finch is under sentence to be hanged February 5, two weeks from today, but as soon as his appeal is perfected a stay of execution will be granted, until the appeal is tried out in the supreme court.

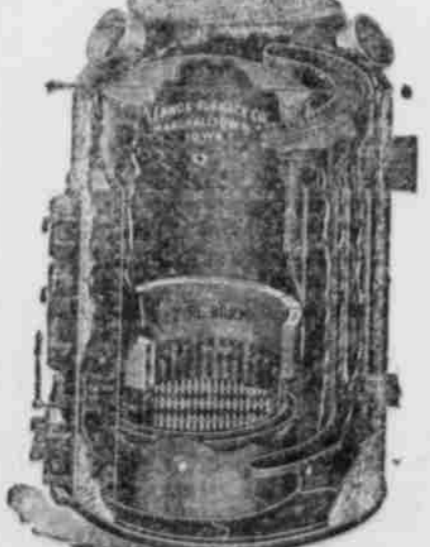
