

PACIFIC FLEET WILL
GO TO THE SOUND

Navy Yard, Puget Sound, Wash., Jan. 22.—The navy department today announced that the following vessels of the Pacific fleet have been assigned to this yard for repairs: Cruisers Albany, Boston, Colorado, New Orleans; battleships Oregon; cruisers, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Washington, Concord, Princeton, Rainbow, Wheeling, Collier Saturn, supply ship Supply and torpedo boats Goldsborough and Rowan. The cruisers California, South Dakota, West Virginia and Maryland are to be docked here after which they are to go to Mare Island for repairs.

WILL CREATE STILL
ANOTHER BOARD

[United Press Leased Wire.] Olympia, Wash., Jan. 22.—The bill creating a state board of charities has already made its appearance and will be followed shortly by a bill which will place under the control of this board all organizations in the state which seek funds in the name of charity. This has particular reference to the Salvation Army and other institutions of a like nature which profess to spend the money collected in the aid of the needy. To solicit funds for charity all such organizations will have to secure a license from the State Board.

SALEM TO TACKLE
JEFFERSON

The second in a series of debates which will decide the high school championship of the state will be pulled off this evening in the high school building. The question is a live one, as usual, and one which is of peculiar interest to the people of Oregon, because of the fact that it is very likely to be decided by the legislature before its adjournment. The statement of the question is: "Resolved, That the consolidated county system of public schools (with elective county boards, with power to appoint county superintendent), should be adopted in Oregon, in lieu of the present system of rural school districts."

Both of the teams have had experience in debating, and each has won one debate already this year. The local team consists of Howard Zimmerman, Seth Axley and Robert Minton. Each of these has showed that he has a level head and knows how to handle himself on the rostrum. Under the excellent coaching of Prof. Eastham, of the high school, they have gotten together a bunch of arguments which they hope will win another scalp for them.

The interest in the opposing team (from Jefferson) is heightened by the fact that their leader, Miss Jane Steinberg, is an old Salem high school student. Miss Steinberg was a member of the freshman class in Salem high last year, and is now coming back to defeat her old schoolmates. The other two members of the Jefferson team are Miss Rose Mason and Lloyd Mason.
