BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND DOINGS IN GENERAL BY THE SOLONS

House, Jan. 23, 1909, 10 a. m.
Opened with prayer by Rev. Campbell from labor and industry committee reported favorably eight hour factory act. Report adopted. McCue, S. B. No. 10, raise salary justice and constable Seaside. Favorably reported and adopted.

Muncy reported favorably H. B. No. 75, that mining companies be exempted from corporation tax. Brook and McKinney brought in a minority report. It was adopted and bill killed.

Committee on resolutions reported senate memorial for \$100,000 for Alaska wagon roads. Adopted.

Also senate memorial for national aid in construction of state highways. Adopted.

Also senate resolution to exchange documents with other states. Adopted.

Also joint memorial for removing tariff on grain, wool and hop sacking. Adopted.

Also house memorial that senators be elected by direct vote of the people. Adopted.

Voting "no", Beals.
House memorial against repeal of tax on oleomargarine. Adopted.

House memorial to regulate size of apple boxes and defeat of Porter bill in congress. Adopted.

House resolution, \$108 stamps for sergeant at arms, Eby. Adopted.

House resolution, that speaker may order bills reprinted. Adopted.

House concurrent resolution to examine Cascade locks, with clerks. Not adopted.

House resolution for tabulated list of appropriations, and no appropriation bill to be introduced after January 30. Adopted; "Noes," Applegate, Barrett and speaker.

House resolution, for budget system and expert clerk to be employed. Adopted.

New House Bills.

H. B. No. 150, by Eastern Oregon delegation, for bounties on wild animals.

H. B. No. 151, Davis by request, to prohibit shipment of liquors to dry precincts.

H. B. No. 152, Mariner, to amend code relating to injunctions.

H. B. No. 153, Dodds, by request, to amend code, relating to railroad passes.

H. B. No. 154, Altman, to amend laws for establishment of union high school.

H. B. No. 155, Dodds, by request, to permit employers of railroad commission or members or employees to ride on any train or engine.

156, by Davis, by request, relating to rate of interest.

H. B. No. 157, by irrigation committee, water code.

House bills on table read second time.

McCue from committee on revision of laws on H. B. No. 14, substitute reported substitute. Referred to Multnomah delegation. Ordered printed. Refers to salary district attorney.

House bill No. 11, referred to committee on ways and means.

Brattain of Lake called to chair. Senate.

Jan. 22, 10 a. m.

The senate was called to order at 10 o'clock and Rev. Selleck offered prayer. The following bills were read the first time:

S. B. 105, Albee, to provide for the punishment of tramps and vagrants.

S. B. No. 1-06, Abraham, to amend code relating to the salary of the state librarian so that it will be \$1800 per year.

S. B. 107, Coffey, to provide for good seats for motormen on street cars.

S. B. 108, Kellher, relating to commissioners of Multnomah county.

S. B. 109, Scholfield, to appropriate \$15,000 for a hatchery on the Columbia river.

Third Reading of Bills.

S. B. 32, Hart, to raise the salary of the judge of the eighth judicial district from \$3000 to \$4000. Passed Abraham and Wood voted "no."

S. B. 22, Abraham, to abolish non-suits in certain cases. Re-referred.

S. B. Nottingham, to provide for the registration of voters who are absent from the state. Passed; Bailey and Sinnott voted against the bill.

S. B. 20, Chase, to fix the salary of Curry county treasurer at \$600. Passed.

S. B. 6, Oliver, to set off one judgment by another judgment between the same parties. Passed.

S. B. 16, Kellher, requiring all hotels and lodging houses to provide

fire escapes. Passed; Bingham, Miller of Linn and Lane, Norton and Smith of Marion voted against the bill.

S. B. 18, Kellher, to require hotel and lodging houses to furnish sheets nine feet long. Passed; Barrett, Johnson, Kay, Miller of Linn and Lane, Nottingham and Smith of Marion voted "No."

S. B. 27, Parrisa, to raise the salary of the sheriff of Grant county. Passed.

S. B. Parrish, to increase the salary of treasurer of Grant county. Passed.

S. B. 31, Oliver, to increase the salary of the recorder of Union county. Passed.

S. B. 43, Miller of Linn, to provide for the Linn county fair association and appropriating \$1000 therefor. Passed; Barrett and Wood voted against the bill.

Adjourned until 2 p. m.

THINKS PRESIDENT'S ACTION CHILDISH

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 23.—Russell H. Conwell of Philadelphia, world famous lecturer, preacher, educator and author, who is in this city, today characterized the action of President Roosevelt in instigating the libel suit against the New York World as "childish and foolish to the last degree."

Rev. Conwell made this statement after he had read a telegram from the World which asked:

"Should the government in the present action against the World succeed in establishing a precedent for the prosecution of newspapers, what, in your opinion, would be the resulting danger to the freedom of the press, to public liberty, the freedom of elections, etc.?"

"I cannot answer this telegram just now," said Conwell. "But I will say now that I think the action of the President in instigating the suit, regardless of the merits of the case, is childish and foolish to the last degree."

"I believe in President Roosevelt and in his administration, but this last action against the newspapers is going too far. President Roosevelt is stooping beneath the dignity of a president when he meddles in such things."

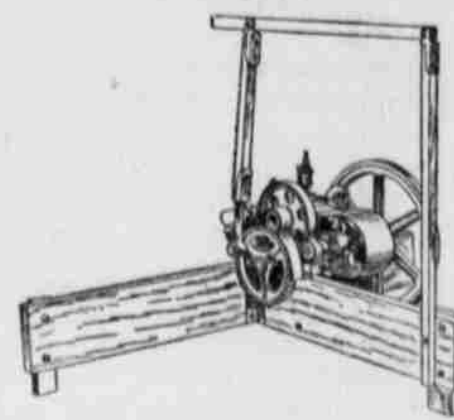
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
