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RAISING SALARIES IN MARION COUNTY.

The Marion county delegation is read with demands for increased salaries for the county officials.

The matter should be carefully investigated, and where it can be shown that new additional duties have been imposed on an official after he took the office, THAT WORK HE SHOULD BE PAID FOR.

If the growth of the county has made it impossible for an official to properly attend to the duties of his office without additional help he should be given some consideration. Marion county is well governed in most respects, and has a fine set of men in office, but the taxes are very high taken as a whole, and THE TAXPAYERS CANNOT STAND MUCH MORE.

The county judge and commissioners are not understood to be asking any increase in compensation, but are certainly the men entitled to some extra pay, if any one is.

They have made a hard fight for a low tax levy and for economy all around, and if the county judge gets \$1500 a year and each of the commissioners \$1400 per year, THEY WOULD NOT GET TOO MUCH.

These men are making a fight to get the county out of debt and back onto a cash basis, and are doing it without pre-election pledges. If any one gets a raise, let them be considered.

THE EDUCATIONAL BILL.

It is understood that the State University is not asking for any additional appropriation this session.

The Agricultural College is asking for a larger sum for equipment, and as the school is growing beyond all bounds IT OUGHT TO HAVE IT.

Representative Lobb's bill to place these institutions and the three normal schools all under one board of five men is meeting with a great deal of favor.

The three Normal Schools have no lobby at this session, but the recommendations of the board for actual running expenses for the three schools WILL PROBABLY BE ACCEPTED WITHOUT OPPOSITION.

Everything foreign to the preparation of teachers for the public schools have been cut out of them, they have a uniform course of study and all students pay tuition and dormitory fees.

The Calkins bill that any person attending a state educational institution shall have had at least two years of high school work IS A GOOD ONE, AND SHOULD PASS.

The educational interests at this session are strongly entrenched by young men of high character in hotel houses, who will not allow any legitimate interest to suffer.

The bill for the extension of the common schools to at least six months of each year ought to pass without an opposing vote.

THE ALASKA EXPOSITION.

The demand for \$50,000 more for the Seattle exposition is not meeting with the favor that its advocates expected.

One objection is that the same professional exposition push that has handled these jobs FOR MANY YEARS IS IN CONTROL.
