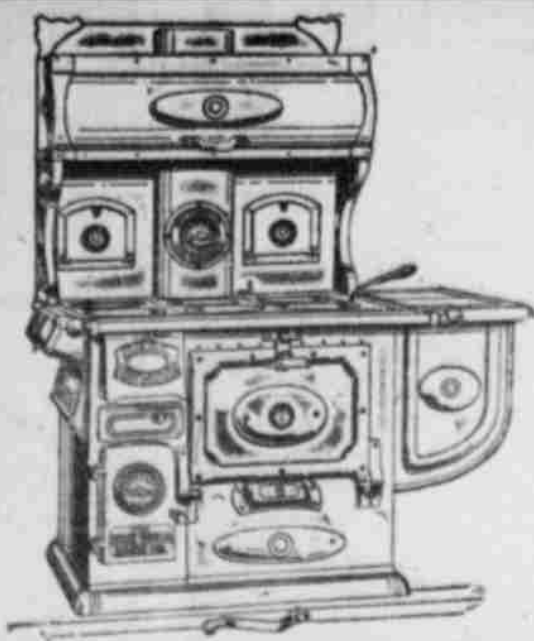

The defeat of the Muncy bill to encourage prospecting and promotion of mines does not end the fight to get more equitable conditions for the undeveloped mining interests of Oregon. The present incorporation tax does keep capital out of the state, and works a great hardship on the mining interests. Senator Hart has a bill for inspection of mines, and in its provisions there is room for the fullest protection and encouragement of mining interests. The mem-

bers from the mining counties will be found rallying around Senator Hart to get relief, and they will find him a safe leader. He is a lawyer of ability and a legislator of a great deal of experience. The Hart bill should pass and something done to revive the languishing mining interests. If half as much were done to encourage mining as is done by the state for the lawyers this state would have a great future. Give the miners a chance and they will produce the wealth.

He has learned that the country, with its enormous resources of natural wealth comes out of every panic with greater latent possibilities than when the skies are the darkest, then is the time to wager by wise investment that the country will live; and that when everybody is convinced that this is the greatest commercial nation on earth then is the time to convert stocks into money.

Never before in history has there been such a spectacle of investors buying securities in a panic as in 1907. Sixteen of the leading railroads and industries had 150,000 shareholders before the panic and 150,000 after the panic. A hundred thousand small investors, convinced that the country was sound and that the big corporations would weather the storm, took their money out of the banks and bought the shares of these 16 companies. Nearly all the increase in shareholders' lists since 1904 was made in this panic. The small investors stood aside in the boom of 1904 and patiently waited for the crash. When the crash came they deluged Wall street with buying orders. They poured their savings into the market when the rich speculators, who had failed to unload on the public at the top, were "sweating blood" under their heavy burden of stocks. Some of the most powerful speculators in the country very nearly reached the end of their resources in that panic. The small investors turned the tide.—Frank Farant in Appleton's.

### LEGISLATIVE HALLS

### BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND DOINGS IN GENERAL BY THE SOLONS

#### Senate—Monday Morning.

Called to order at 11 o'clock with 25 senators present. Senator Nottingham introduced two resolutions—one to investigate the institute for the feeble minded, and the other to instruct ways and means committee to prepare a statement showing appropriations asked for. New bills were introduced as follows:

#### New Senate Bills.

S. B. 111, Chase, to fix boundary of Curry county.

S. B. 112, Wood, relating to the sale of manufactured feed stuff.

S. B. 113, Barrett, to amend code relating to acquiring of property in incorporated towns.

S. B. 114, Malt, relating to banks.

S. B. 115, Hart, to amend code relating to salary of clerk of supreme court.

S. B. 116, Hart, to amend code relating to supreme court.

S. B. 117, Smith of Umatilla, to amend code relating to prosecuting attorney.

S. B. 118, Bailey, to amend general laws relating to delinquent children.

A large number of bills were read the second time and referred to the standing committees.

#### Third Reading of Bills.

S. B. 115, Beach, to amend general laws of 1897 concerning bank deposits. Passed.

Lincoln county is anxious to have an ocean line established between the Yaquina bay and San Francisco.

An automobile line is to be put on between Vale and Burns, taking the place of stages. The trip will be made in six hours.

### LIGHTSHIPS REACH SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Jan. 25.—Weather beaten and stained by the storms of many seas, the lightship flotilla sailed into port yesterday, 125 days out from New York. The little fleet, consisting of three lightships and three lighthouse tenders, made its voyage of more than 14,000 miles without mishap, and Captain Albert Merts, who is in command, is highly pleased with the performance of his staunch little craft. Out of Callao, the lightships were taken in tow by the tenders to save coal, and 175 miles were covered in this way.

The lightship Columbia River No. 88, will go north to guard the entrance of the stream after which she is named. The Swiftsure, No. 93, and the tender Manzanita go to the Straits of Fuca, the entrance to Puget Sound. The Relief and tender Sequela will remain here, and the tender Kuqui goes to Honolulu.
