## The River Just Tumbled—

## ROOT RESIGNS AND BACON SUCCEEDS HIM

(United Press, London Wire.)  
Washington, Jan. 25.—President Roosevelt today received the resignation of Secretary of State Elihu Root, recently elected senator from New York. The nomination of Robert Bacon, now assistant secretary of state, was sent to the senate to succeed Root.

The President also nominated John C. Loughlin as assistant secretary of state, to succeed Bacon.

# GREAT DIVISIONS HAVE BEEN A LITTLE AVERTED

## MULTNOMAH AND MARION WANT NO WAR WITH OTHER COUNTIES

The two great lines of division that have threatened to lead to serious results for the people of Oregon are said to be in a fair way of settlement. The fight of Marion county members in the senate on clerkships and educational institutions led to the introduction of the Bingham resolution to remove the state capital from Salem. It is understood this breach has been healed. The other fight in the House where the Multnomah members held up the general Port Commission act to help the smaller

holders of the state, is also understood to be disposed of and the Bean Port Commission bill is now to go through unopposed. This fight came very nearly losing Portland members the good will of the whole lower House. The Marion county fight came very near embroiling Marion county with Lane, Benton, Umatilla, Jackson and Polk counties that have at least 25 votes in the general assembly. Peace reigns at Warsaw and Tom Ray and Ike Bingham will be sliding down the same cellar door the rest of the session.

# OKLOHOMA BANK GUARANTY BILL IS AMENDED

## JONES INDIAN WAR VETERAN BILL IS SPECIAL ORDER

In the house this afternoon the special order was on the Jones bill to reimburse Indian War veterans for per diem and loss of horses and other property.

Orton, author of the Oklahoma banking bill, has consented to an amendment that will allow bankers

to borrow back from the state three-fourths of their guaranty deposit of one per cent on circulation.

About one-half the time of both houses is taken up raising salaries of county and state officials.

The Marion county delegation has not been able to agree on any of the salary bills before them.

# TO STOP HUNTING GAME BIRDS WITH HUNTING DOGS

## UPLAND BIRDS TO BE GIVEN A REST FOR FOUR YEARS

Representative Dimick of Clackamas county has introduced a bill, which, if it should become a law, makes it unlawful from October 1, 1909, to October 1, 1913, to hunt

native or China pheasants, quail, grouse or partridges with dogs. The penalty for violation is fixed at a fine of from \$25 to \$100, or imprisonment from ten to 50 days.

## MALHEUR COUNTY TO TAX ALIEN SHEEP

Following a hearing given a number of wool growers of Malheur county, the commissioners have decided to test the validity of the statute enacted by the Oregon legislature two years ago providing for a tax of 20 cents per head upon sheep owned by non-residents and brought into free ranges in this state. At this time it is estimated that there are upwards of 35,000 sheep from Idaho and Montana on the government ranges in Malheur county, and District Attorney McCulloch has been instructed to collect in the tax. Money paid on the accounts would go to the county school fund.

It is believed that the alien sheep owners now in the county will fight the tax, as there is considerable doubt as to the constitutionality of the statute, and there is likely to be some excitement on the range when the county officers seize the sheep—which will be done if the tax is not paid promptly.

The measure was passed by the legislature at the instance of the wool growers, who, as residents of the state pay taxes and contribute to the commercial prosperity of the county, whereas the Idaho and Montana sheepmen who winter on the Malheur ranges take their sheep away before the shearing season, so that their wool is marketed elsewhere.

The ranges are free and some of the stockmen are advocating the adoption by the government of the leasing system, which it is claimed would result in the conservation of the water and fodder and greatly in-

crease the grazing capacity of the country.—Heppner Gazette.
