## CELEBRATED BURNS' BIRTHDAY

The most successful and pleasing Robert Burns' meeting ever held in this city, occurred last night in McMinn's dancing hall when songs, recitations and real old Scotch dancing made the evening one long to be remembered.

Led by President P. H. D'Arcy, of the club, made the opening address to the crowd of about 40 Burns' lovers. Judge Wm. Galloway spoke glowingly of the character and humanness of "Bobby" Burns.

Dan J. Frye spoke briefly on the love of the Swedish people for the memory of Burns and of their great respect for him.

W. P. Swope, of Portland, talked wittily on the subject. He related that of all the great and wonderful things Burns brought to mind, the "Old Hot Scotch" should be a favorite. His talk evidenced his respect and admiration for the people's poet.

The prettiest number on the program was the dance given by Miss Ella May McMinn, the nine-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. McMinn. For the first time in many years some of the spectators had the opportunity of witnessing the Highland fling danced perfectly. Miss Ella, being a light little tot on her feet, kept the time and the turns of the difficult dance admirably, and delighted all.

Master Frank McMinn, the youngest violinist in the city, being but six years of age, gave a violin solo accompanied by his father and sister on cornet and piano. The little youngster was greatly praised.

Mrs. W. Carlton Smith favored the audience with Burns' song, "The Maid of Dundee," giving by her rendition of it an added charm to the sweet old Scottish song.

Hon. John Minto recited several poems of Burns and favored the crowd with a song entitled, "My Highland Mary." In making his closing address, Uncle John said that although Burns had only one friend in the large life of royalty at the time of his living, he is thought of with reverence now by all.

Wm. McElchrist then sang the great favorite song of the Scotchman, "Bonnie Mary Argyle."

**Killed Her Roommate—**  
Mrs. Susan Freese, who was received at the state insane asylum from Lane county, Ore., January 23, 1909, was strangled to death by her room-mate last night. She had been noisy, which is thought to have annoyed her room-mate, who, on account of this, held a sheet over her mouth, and, without intending to injure her seriously, killed her. When the night attendant, Mrs. Mary Martin, one of the most faithful employees of the institution, discovered them, the aggressor patient had returned to her bed, and did not know what she had done. A physician was promptly called, but was unable to resuscitate the unfortunate victim. Coroner Clough was notified and made a thorough investigation of all the circumstances, resulting in the exoneration of the asylum officials and employes from any blame.
