TO REMOVE WRECK OF BATTLESHIP MAINE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, Jan. 27.—President Roosevelt today sent a special message to congress urging an appropriation for the removal of the wreckage of the battleship Maine from Havana harbor, in accordance with the recommendation of Governor Magoon.

The action of the President follows a recent complaint on the part of Magoon that the wreckage constituted an impediment to shipping in the harbor, and that failure to remove it caused an unfavorable comment that the United States feared its removal would reveal the fact that the Maine sank from an internal explosion.
