BRAVE MEN BEGGED LIFE PRESERVERS FROM THE WOMEN

ONE FINANCIER THOUGHT HIS LIFE WAS WORTH THAT OF 100 WOMEN

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 28.—Declaring that she believes the death list in the Republic disaster last Saturday was greater than announced by the officers of the wrecked liner, Mrs. C. A. Severance, of St. Paul, who is here today with her husband, also said that stories of bravery told by some of the men who were on the ship were purely imaginary. Severance is an attorney for the interstate commerce commission, and is well-known on the Pacific coast.

"Two men died in my arms when I was assisting as a nurse after the accident," said Mrs. Severance, who was a passenger on the Republic, "and I am sure a great many more were killed than the officials admit. I saw not a few lying dead under blankets."

"While it has been generally reported that everybody on the ship behaved bravely, I must say that the reports have been misleading. Some

of the men were craven cowards. One of these, whom I understand to be a prominent financier and clubman, said that he thought he ought to be taken off first. He was heard to say: 'My life is worth more than that of a hundred women.'

"A young man named Phelps, a mere boy, who had been made a special officer by our captain, held this man back at the point of a pistol."

"My maid found one man crying as if his heart would break, and begging women for a life preserver. The women gave it to him."

"Two other men, both of them prominent, had to be knocked down to keep them from rushing into the boats before the women and children."

"Another, who almost jumped into the boats on the heads of the woman face to face for a few minutes," himself written up on his acts of bravery. I wish I could meet that man face to face for a few minutes."

COUNTERFEITERS CAUGHT IN 'FRISCO

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Jan. 28.—Robert Bradley, a man of superior education and refinement, who, after a close study of metallurgy, in which he learned to manufacture half and quarter dollars of base metal in wonderful counterfeit of government, is in the city prison today after a desperate battle with three secret service agents, who had been trailing him for several months.

Josie Livingston, a slender, fair-haired girl, his companion, endeavored to aid Bradley in his fight with the government agents, and was placed under arrest, after a struggle, in which Detective Sergeant McMahon was scratched and bitten by the woman.

Bradley and Miss Livingston, who posed as his wife, first rented a bungalow in a deserted part of the ocean highway. There the counterfeiting plant was set up by Bradley. How the government operatives first obtained a hint of his work, this version is said, but learned of the man's plans and secret service men, H. N. Moffett and Joseph Nye, were detailed to watch him.

The agents followed Bradley to the public library, where they watched him studying works on met-

allurgy. They trailed him to where he bought his supplies of silver and alloy. The followed him to the foundry where plates and castings for his molds were constructed. It was Secret Service Agent Nye who aided Bradley and a teamster to lift from the mud a wagon which contained material for their counterfeit.

Bradley and his companion suddenly moved to the heart of the city, and the secret service men decided to make the raid. Aided by Detective McMahon, the three men entered Bradley's room. As they broke in, Bradley seized his revolver from a table, but Nye and Moffett were too quick for him.

The woman ran to aid Bradley but McMahon caught her. After a desperate struggle Bradley was disarmed and handcuffed. When she saw him in irons Miss Livingston ceased struggling with McMahon and began to weep.

Both Bradley and his companion will be arraigned before a United States commissioner tomorrow on a charge of counterfeiting. The evidence against them is contained in two sacks of half dollars and quarters of almost faultless workmanship together with the best coin molds the government officers have ever seen.

CALIFORNIA TO HAVE PRIMARY LAW

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 28.—Senator Anthony Caminetti today introduced in the legislature a bill to enable the people of the state to express by ballot their preference for the office of United States senator.

This is practically the same bill introduced two years ago by Senator J. B. Sanford.

The feature of this measure is the double form of statement which legislators may sign if they desire. One pledges the elected lawmaker to abide by the choice of the people for United States senator, as expressed in the election which placed him in office. According to this promise, the legislator must "always vote for that candidate for United States senator who shall have received for that office the highest number of the votes cast at the general election."

The other pledge merely classifies the vote of the people as "nothing more than a recommendation" which the lawmaker shall consider but shall be at liberty wholly to disregard if he sees fit.

An effort will be made to substitute this measure for any and all solutions of the questions of electing a United States senator, now before the legislature in special bills and direct primary acts.

GOOD BILL SOUGHT TO BE KILLED

FIGHT TO RESTORE THE OREGON BOOT ATTACHMENT LAW

In the calm and peace of Wednesday afternoon a motion to reconsider the bill that passed the day before amending the old Oregon attachment law, which is patterned after the old Oregon boot that used to be put on prisoners. Calkins of Lane who voted for the bill, Purdin, who voted against it, both argued for retaining the bill as it had passed. The bill as passed by the House requires that any man to have his goods attached must be shown to be an absconding debtor, or that he is trying to defraud his creditors by disposing of his property to defraud them. "At-

tachment is a drastic remedy and is only resorted to when a man is trying to run away. That is the only time when an attachment should issue." The writ of attachment in Oregon is the obsolete law of England and the provinces 50 years ago when they put people in prison for debt, said Campbell. Mr. Mahoney said this was not a law in the interest of bankers. They seldom need the law, and he hoped it would not be reconsidered. The lawyers had the way and the bill was reconsidered to restore the old Oregon boot system that was the law of civilized communities 50 years ago.
