LABOR TROUBLES IN ARIZONA

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Phoenix, Ariz., Jan. 28.—Although the trouble between the miners and operators at Globe is less acute than yesterday, Acting Governor Page has notified the officers of the various state militia companies to hold their men in readiness to proceed to that town.

A thousand miners are idle because of an attempt to organize a union among the employees of the mines. When the movement got under way the operators ordered the men to cease the agitation. This they refused to do, and all were discharged.

The men have made no trouble and the operators have signified a willingness to deal with the men, but not with representatives of any union.

INSURANCE PUBLICITY IS SECURED AMENDMENT REQUIRING AN ANNUAL STATEMENT IN BEAN BILL

The Bean bill creating an insurance department, which will probably pass both houses without opposition, contains a clause requiring publication of an annual statement of resources and liabilities of all insurance companies doing business in the

state. This is an amendment that will give a long desired publicity to insurance business.

The statement is to be printed in two Portland papers, and in one paper in each county where the companies maintain an office to transact business.

BOTH GROW TIRED AFTER FIVE YEARS

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 28.—A. W. Robins, a local restaurateur and his wife next Saturday will celebrate their wooden wedding having been married for five years and will then separate. The couple five years ago signed an agreement for a trial marriage and in the agreement was inserted a clause that if the trial was successful the mutual agreement could be renewed. According

to Robins it will not be renewed although neither feels aggrieved at the other.

Robins and his wife made what is termed an ideal couple. Both, however, came to regard their marriage as a restriction of personal rights and although neither has a complaint to make against the other each feels that the marriage has not been a success. They have therefore agreed to part but will remain good friends.

LETTER SAYS BLACK WAS A HARD CASE

A letter which will probably dispel all doubt in the minds of many who were not convinced that Homer Black actually shot Dr. Chas. Robertson, was received this morning by Sheriff Harry Minto from Sheriff M. Meadows, of El Centro, Imperial county, Cal., saying that Black was well known in that city and his arrest here and conviction was the first to be heard of him since his hurried departure from California.

The letter stated that while Black was in Mexico, he was the proprietor of a saloon and gambling house. It was said there that he had been implicated in various hold-ups, and after being captured at one time by the Mexican authorities, he made

his getaway and left that city. El Centro knows Black by the name of "Blackie," and he was considered a hard character. His former record is not known by the California sheriff, nor did he know where he hailed from originally.

This bit of information received by the sheriff here, is the first since Black's arrest and conviction. The officials here have been exerting their every effort to learn something definite regarding Black's history, but were unsuccessful. The largest criminal agency in the United States, at Fort Leavenworth, was unable to give out any knowledge of him, which is good evidence that he kept well under cover.

YOUNG NEGRO KILLS THREE WHITE BOYS

Cincinnati, Jan. 28.—Despite the fact that one white boy is dead and two are dying as the result of being shot by him last night, Atlas Telford, an 18-year-old negro, made such an eloquent plea when presented in court today that no charge was placed against him.

Telford declares that he is studying law, but that race prejudice threatens to check his ambition. He said he was set upon by a crowd of white boys as he was leaving school last night, and shot in self-defense. William Weebold is dead and William Brill and Charles Ruff are dying as the victims of the negro's revolver.

The police are inclined to accept the assertion of Telford. They say they found stones in the pocket of one of his victims. The friends of Weebold and the two dying boys are infuriated at the result of the preliminary hearing.

It is feared that the bitter race feeling which is responsible for the trouble last night, may break out anew.

Telford is employed as a house boy at the residence of Judge Albert C. Thompson, of the United States district court.

KEEPS WIRES WARM OVER JAP SITUATION

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 28.—President Roosevelt is keeping the wires between the White House and the capitol busy with messages relating to the anti-Japanese situation in the legislature. Bright and early today a telegram came from him to Assemblyman A. M. Drew, of Fresno, author of the anti-alien bill, prohibiting Japanese owning land in California, asking that the Fresno man delay action on his measure until after the arrival of the letter on the Japanese question which Roosevelt has mailed to Governor Gillett.

JAPAN ALSO HAS HER ANARCHISTS

Tokyo, Jan. 28.—Dispatches were received here today from Pienyang, Korea, saying that a bomb was thrown at a party of government officials during the imperial tour on Tuesday. It is supposed to have been a demonstration against the pro Japanese-Korean court.

The same dispatches bring news of an attack upon Minister of the Interior Sung, who was stabbed by a would-be assassin while he was on board the royal train.

Prince Ito, the resident general of Korea, is ill and in general the affairs of the peninsula are in a troubled state.

ANOTHER JAP NOBLE GETS IN TROUBLE

Tokio, Jan. 28.—Officialdom and the nobility are aroused to expression of deep disgust today by the announcement of the engagement of Count Tanaka, minister of the imperial household, to marry Miss Ko Kobayashi, a young woman of plebeian rank.

The count is 47 years old and a widower. His bride-to-be is but 20 years old. The announcement has called forth much censure, and Prince Yamagata has advised Tanaka to resign his noble post. The news is particularly displeasing, following the affair of Count Toso, who married a Hungarian widow, and brought disgrace to his entire family.

Rudovitz Set Free.

Chicago, Jan. 28.—Christian Rudovitz was released from prison today on orders received here from Secretary of State Root, explaining that the request of Russia for his extradition had been refused by the state department.

Rudovitz is a political refugee from Russia. The czar's officers attempted to secure his return to Russia.
