### TOLD VICTIMS HOW TO MAKE DOUGHNUTS

(United Press Licensed Wire.) Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 29.—Fifteen hundred letters addressed to the Bertha Day and Diamond Turquoise Companies, of Los Angeles, are being held here today by the postoffice, following the issuance of a fraud order at Washington.

Diamonds and doughnuts are said to have been the stock in trade of the two companies, which are believed to be owned by the same persons.

According to the postal inspectors, the Bertha Day Company advertised that it would furnish the secret of making and selling doughnuts, chewing gum and candy at ridiculously low prices. All that the writer had to do, it is alleged, was to send a small sum to the Bertha Day Company, Box A, Los Angeles, whereupon the formula, together with instructions as how to become an expert would be forwarded. The unusually large amount of mail which the two companies were receiving in Los Angeles attracted the attention of the authorities and resulted in an investigation, which led to the issuing of the fraud order.
