San Francisco, Feb. 1.—The trial of Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads, accused of offering a bribe to the hoodling board of supervisors, entered upon the fourth week this morning, with eight jurors temporarily selected. Five hundred ventremen have been examined. The prosecution has five peremptory challenges left and the defense still retains ten. At the rate the trial has been progressing it is doubtful if a complete jury will be sworn in inside of ten weeks. It is also probable that 1500 ventremen may have been examined before the actual taking of evidence begins.
