City Council Meets—

The regular meeting of the city council will take place this evening, and among other things the \$1.50 gas franchise and the plan for a 60-foot wooden bridge on South Commercial street will be presented.

Exercises at Monmouth—

The annual mid-year graduating exercises at the Monmouth State Normal school take place today and this evening. There are six graduates, and 30 will finish in June. To the disgrace of Oregon, the Monmouth normal school has been permitted to run for two years on private funds, to produce teachers for the Oregon public schools. Yet the diplomas are issued by the state, and the state administrators the school and owns about \$100,000 worth of school property there.

All Want Athletics—

At the teachers' institute at Turner Saturday, the athletic union question was brought up, and an executive committee was appointed to arrange a schedule of sports and by-laws, and to form some plan to organize an athletic union. The committee appointed was A. C. Baker, of Turner, president; Miss Lizzie Cornelius, of Stayton, treasurer, and Albert Frost, of Woodburn, secretary. The committee will report at the Woodburn meeting next Saturday and arrange the subject more fully.

New Colony of "Mormons"—

Councilman and Mrs. Enos Presnall are home from a three-months' trip East. Most of their time was spent in Indiana, where Mr. Presnall found a ready sale for prunes, dried at his plant near Marion. Returning with them to Oregon was Mrs. Presnall's brother, Don Mormon, and family, his son, Homer Mormon, and family from Indiana, who will go into the fruit business and make their home here.

Lecture by Mr. Rhodes—

A large and appreciative audience attended the lecture given by State Secretary Rhodes, of the Y. M. C. A., yesterday afternoon at the association rooms. Mr. Rhodes' subject was "A Battle for Heroic Men."

Appointed Caples—

Senator Chamberlain today appointed Robert Caples, of Portland, as his private secretary, but the latter, owing to business matters, declined. No other appointment was made.

A Fast Launch—

A gasoline motor boat is now under construction at the Larsen carriage shop, on Liberty street, which will be, when completed, the speediest water cruiser ever run on the Willamette river this side of Portland. Percy Larsen, the well-known young boat builder, is building the fast launch for his own use, and he expects to have it running within a month. When in perfect condition Mr. Larsen's boat will run at the rate of 15 miles an hour. It is 22 1/2 feet in length, and built on the latest plans of racing motor boats. A 10-horse power gasoline engine will provide power for the racer, and the latest equipment will be provided in the way of rudders, steering gear and screws. The bottom of the boat is built flat, and is formed in tapering shape, with a slight bend up toward the bow. The stern is constructed arrow shape to avoid the common trouble of suction. The capacity of the launch is from six to eight persons. It is furnished with comfortable cushions and back rests. From the top of the launch to the water line it will be painted white, and the water line will be red. This is the first boat of the kind in Salem, and

when Mr. Larsen has it in running order he will accept challenges from any motor boat owner on the river.

DEACON SAYS HE STOLE HER HUSBAND'S GRAVE

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 1.—Kneeling at the altar seeking admission to the fashionable Oak Grove Baptist church, Mrs. Wiley Heide was confronted with charges that she had stolen the grave in which her husband's body is buried, and today has fled suit for \$15,000 damages against Deacon W. H. Mitchell, her accuser. In her petition Mrs. Heide says that the preacher was holding her hand, and about to welcome her into the church, when the deacon arose and cried:

"I object to her becoming a member of our church, because she has trespassed upon the church's property by burying her husband in the church cemetery. She stole the lot that she buried her husband in, and is now seeking membership in the church to keep her husband buried in the church cemetery."

The preacher refused to admit her to membership until the charges had been investigated.

The basis of the deacon's charge is that when Heide died neither he nor his wife was a member of the church, and the widow had no right to bury the body in the church cemetery.

Mrs. Heide and Mitchell are wealthy.

WASHINGTON NOW WANTS TO BE GOOD

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 1.—A treaty to last from six to eight years, and to be ratified by the United States senate in the hope of settling the boundary dispute between Washington and Oregon is to be the outcome of the meeting yesterday of the legislative committees from both states. The question affects salmon fishing in the Columbia river, an industry that has been at the bottom of many disputes between the fishing interests of Washington and Oregon. The plan is to have the treaty on the interstate fish war ratified by the

legislature in the two states, then ratified again by congress, after which it is to be signed by the President. This would give either state the right to appeal to the federal courts in case of further trouble.

"LESE MAJESTE" CASE STILL ON BOARDS

Buffalo, N. Y., Feb. 1.—Norman E. Mack, chairman of the Democratic national campaign committee, was served with a subpoena today by a United States marshal, directing him to appear before the federal court in New York tomorrow, in connection with the action of the government against the New York World, outgrowing the publication of articles reflecting on the purchase of the Panama canal.
