HOP BOOSTERS WANT SEPERATE VOTE ON BEER

MANY PRECINCTS WOULD DRIVE OUT WHISKEY IN FAVOR OF MALT BEVERAGES

The hop industry got a boost Tuesday night before the committee on revision of laws on the bill requiring separate submission of the question of selling malt beverages to the voters at all local option elections. A solid delegation of business men who raise families, support churches and sometimes drink beer made speeches for the bill. Rev. Sellick and several other representatives of the local option law combatted the idea of letting the wet precincts have a separate vote on beer and whiskey. The ministers made some good points. Beer was nothing but the kindergarten of all boozing, and caused the ruin of more young girls, etc., etc.

PRESIDENT LEWIS IS RE-ELECTED

(United Press Leased Wire.) Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 2.—President Thomas L. Lewis, of the United Mine Workers of America, has been elected president to the office he now holds. In spite of the efforts of his enemies in the organization to beat him.

The report of the tellers, which was made public today, shows that Lewis has a majority of 16,349 votes over Candidate Walker, of Illinois. Lewis' vote was 52,657 and that of his opponent 44,748. The vote for vice-president was as follows:

W. D. Van Horn, Indiana, 45,588; John Dempsey, Pennsylvania, 20,891; Sam Paxon, Illinois, 21,415; E. S. McCollough, Michigan, 17,987; C. P. Gilday, Pennsylvania, 6,418; W. H. McCloskey, Missouri, 4,828; J. W. Murray, Illinois, 15,114.

For secretary-treasurer: Edwin Terry, Indiana, 42,795; John Fahn, Pennsylvania, 42,359; John W. Harrison, Pennsylvania, 11,374; Joseph Pope, Illinois, 32,893; John Fahn, Indiana, 11,345.

The election of these officials will be ratified by the convention in March here.

John Mitchell, former president of the miners' organization, received 114,572 votes as a candidate as delegate to the American Federation of Labor convention. This was the largest vote received by any candidate. The other delegates elected are: John H. Walker and Frank J. Harnet, of Illinois; W. D. Wilson, Pennsylvania; C. W. Sage, Ohio; John P. White, Iowa.

CRATER LAKE WAGON ROAD BOOSTERS HERE

SIXTY MEMBERS PUSHING FOR \$100,000 ROAD-BILL BEFORE LEGISLATURE --INVITED TO BOARD OF TRADE BANQUET

A Pullman carload of Medford boosters arrived in the city this morning to whom it up for the Crater Lake automobile road, for which the legislature is to appropriate \$100,000. UPPER SACRAMENTO VALLEY IS SWEEPED BY RESISTLESS FLOOD

LEVEES BROKEN, TOWNS INUNDATED AND WHOLE COUNTY UNDER WATER

Sacramento, Cal., Feb. 2.—The highest waters ever known have been recorded at Tehama, St. Johns, and other points on the upper Sacramento river. Great areas of rich farming lands are flooded. St. Johns, Glenn county, is covered with four feet of water, and is in the middle of a vast sea of water. The Southern Pacific and county bridges are tottering, and are expected to collapse.

Many people are being rescued by boats along the Sacramento river. The levees near Phelan ranch, Butte county, are threatened. If these levees should give way, more than a thousand cattle will be lost. A big gang of men has gone from Chico to fight for the levees. Tehama is under water. The railroad bridge at this point has been washed out, but all the inhabitants are safe.

Tehama People Flee.

Chico, Cal., Feb. 2.—A train was hurriedly made up at Tehama this morning and took load of passengers out of the city. The citizens are terror-stricken, and a general exodus is in progress. The water is over the entire city and surrounding country, and is rising rapidly.

Later in the day the Phelan levees burst and 10,000 acres of land in Butte county are under water. The water here rose one foot since 5 o'clock this morning.

PUBLICITY IS THE SURE CURE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., Feb. 2.—Publicity as a cure for corporation abuses is recommended by Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations. In statement by him made public today. The commissioner suggests that provision should be made for a system of regular reports from the large interstate corporations, and that the government officials should have access at all reasonable times to the records and accounts of such concerns.

Other suggestions along this line follow: Safeguard from publication of proper business secrets. Recognition by the government of the right to combine under proper regulation. That the corporations be under administrative rather than judicial supervision.

UNKNOWN MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Feb. 2.—Efforts are being made today to definitely establish the identity of a man supposed to have been Horace K. Butler, of San Jose, Calif., who committed suicide here yesterday in the Roland Hotel.

When the body was found, a revolver with one chamber empty was clutched in one of the man's hands. Although he registered at the hotel as Horace H. Bird, addresses on letters found in his possession indicated that his right name was Butler.
