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A FAKE STATE PRINTING REFORM BILL.

The bill rushed to passage in the House to have the State own a big printing plant and put the printer on a salary is a fake reform bill.

A straight cut on prices paid or a provision to let the work to the lowest bidder as the state needs it **WOULD HAVE MORE MERIT.**

This bill creates a new office and is in plain violation of the constitutional provisions for the State Printing office.

Under it the legislature could invest \$50,000 to \$100,000 in perishable and easily destructible machinery **AT THE MERCY OF RECKLESS MEN.**

The bill carries appropriations of \$81,100 and does not limit the amount of money that could be tied up in presses, linotype machines, etc.

Unless the present system can be improved upon the present state printer has cut down the cost of production about 35 per cent **AND WITH AN AMENDED LAW COULD CUT IT STILL MORE.**

BIG FIGHT FOR SALARY REFORM.

CELEBRATION OF LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY.

The Oregon legislature has decided to not observe February 12th, the 100th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birthday. **IT IS TOO BUSY, IT WAS SAID.**

It was announced that the members could attend some of the Republican club banquets at \$1 per.

Upon the recommendation of President Roosevelt, congress has declared Feb. 12 to be a special legal holiday. This action would doubtless have been taken earlier were it not that the joint resolution covering it made provision also for the taking of preliminary steps in the matter of the construction of a road from Washington to Gettysburg to be known as "The Lincoln Way."

UPON THIS THERE WAS CONSIDERABLE DEBATE.

Illinois, the state which gave Lincoln to the country, has long observed his birthday as a legal holiday, **WHICH, HOWEVER, IS NOT TRUE OF KENTUCKY,** the state which gave him birth, nor of that group of middle western states of which Illinois may be called the center—Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa and Missouri—whose people take pride in claiming him as **TYPICAL CITIZEN AND A SON.**

The states which have made February 12 a holiday in honor of Lincoln's memory are: Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Kansas, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Washington and Wyoming.

Some of these have joined the column only within the last two years.

The South does not recognize Lincoln's birthday in any

public way, but private opinion in that section **HAS UNDERGONE A MARVELOUS CHANGE** with regard to this great and good American during recent years, and there is in many quarters of the South evidence of a growing disposition to do his memory something of the reverence which is being paid in greater degree year after year throughout the North to the memory of Robert E. Lee.

There is to be an orator in English and one in German, and the chorus of men's voices will be composed of 30 of the best singers in the city.
