House, 10 a. m., Feb. 4.—House

H. B. 277, Jones of Polk for free
 ferry at Independence.

H. B. 278, Orton, providing inspec-
 tors of election.

H. B. 279, Patton, putting sur-
 veyor Marion county on salary.

H. B. 14, Mahone, deputies for
 district attorneys. Moved by Munk-
 ers to print amended bill. Lost. Bill
 passed.

H. B. 12, to regulate pilots on the

S. B. 34, Oliver, to provide for the
 publication and sale of supreme
 court reports and to provide for a
 supreme court reporter. Passed.

S. B. Mullit, to amend code relating
 to taking of estrays. Passed.

S. B. 157, Sinnott, to regulate ware-
 house receipts. Re-referred.

S. B. 74, Chase, to appropriate
 \$20,000 to build and maintain fish
 hatcheries south of the Columbia riv-
 er. Passed. Abraham and Miller of
 Lion voting against the bill.

S. B. 178, committee on railroads,
 funds to give each school district at
 least \$300. Passed, one vote no, Mr.
 Hattberg.
