AMERICAN FLEET RACING FOR HOME

[United Press Leased Wire.]

Gibraltar, Feb. 6.—With the cannon of a dozen foreign warships in the harbor booming a farewell salute and the guns of the impregnable British fortress in the rock joining in a thunderous chorus, the American battleship fleet sailed on the last leg of the greatest fleet cruise in history, and began the most spectacular portion of their journey around the world.

The fighting ships weighed anchor at 9 o'clock in the morning, and, with the customary precision, steamed from the harbor in single column formation, squadron by squadron, with an equally intervening space between each ship.

When the shores of Gibraltar have been passed the single formation will be broken and the vessels started homeward with pennants fluttering, and will enter a nerve racking race

for the Atlantic shores of the United states.

It will be each ship for itself in an effort to establish a new speed record in the navy. The engines have been thoroughly overhauled, the bunkers crammed with coal, and the "black gangs" keyed up to a high pitch of enthusiasm for the finish.

The fleet will rendezvous in Hampton Roads, where it will be reviewed by President Roosevelt, who will crown his presidential service with a floating pageant. The vessels will then disperse to the various navy yards on the Atlantic coast, and will undergo whatever repairs may be necessary.

Reports on their condition will be forwarded to the navy department, but from the various reports sent to the department from time to time, there is little likelihood that any of the ships will need serious overhauling.

The above paragraph is a synopsis of the opinion of the club, and, we may add, the power of the latter will be employed in such hygienic improvements.

The following streets were considered, the only local business performed by the club:

Sidewalks at corner of 19th to Turner, from Turner to Oak. Also the walks on North 24th street.

There were many present who were in a deep quandary as to the method of proceeding with these improvements. Some citizens have been repeatedly before the council with a sidewalk petition, drawn by the city attorney, but said petition has, it seems, been objected to on grounds not explainable.

Something that affects us all is the city delivery of mail. Our present carrier has enough work for two men. It was the consensus of opinion that if this were put before the proper officials relief would be granted immediately.

The next meeting will be held in the Congregational church, corner of 19th and Ferry streets, February 26.
