MANY EASTERNERS COMING TO SALEM

By a little inquiry at the hotels and boarding houses of the city it is readily learned that our town is full of newcomers. This fact is more than ever apparent if one would call at the Board of Trade headquarters and there meet numerous individuals and families in from the East, who are looking up new homes. Several excellent farms have been sold the past week, and many smaller ones are being bargained for. City property is also moving quite freely, as a result of the demand created by these newcomers. Again, there is scarcely an available house for rent, and the people of Salem should begin early with their building operations for this year. This advice should be heeded for several reasons.

First among them, building material is cheaper than it was last summer and fall, and much cheaper than it will be after building operations are fully in motion. Aside from this, labor is now plentiful and help can be had at more reasonable prices than when the demand is greater than the supply. The planing mills are not yet running full blast, and persons wishing to build should take advantage of this lull to get prompt service and the best price. There are now probably 50 houses under construction, and they are practically all taken or spoken for. Hence, those contemplating building should get in motion as soon as possible. The reasons are very apparent, and, above all, the effort should be made to have ample accommodations for the new people coming in.

WANTS THE JAPS SEGREGATED

[United Press Leased Wire.]
Lincoln, Feb. 8.—A bill to segregate Japanese and Chinese laborers from white workmen in the factories and fields of the state was introduced today in the state legislature by Representative Jeremiah Howard, of South Omaha.

The measure provides that the yellow and the brown men must not be employed in company with the Caucasian.

Howard declared that the bill was for the purpose of meeting conditions in South Omaha, where the Japanese were employed in packing houses. The feeling against the Japanese in Omaha is strong, their presence in the factories being offensive to the whites, particularly in departments where women and children are employed.

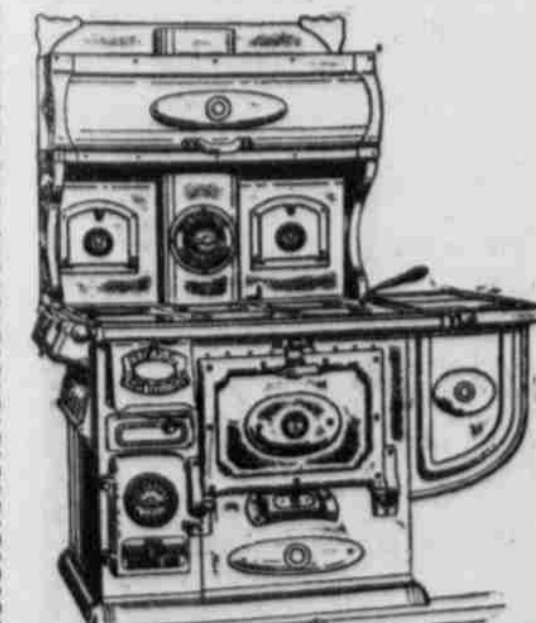
