 state land laws, to accept lands for

H. B. 67, Applegate and Buchanan,
 to increase the salary of Douglas
 county assessor. On motion of
 Abraham the bill was indefinitely
 postponed.

H. B. 51, McCue, to authorize the
 several counties of the state to levy
 taxes for advertising purposes. Re-
 referred.

H. B. 203, Brooks, to amend code
 relating to challenging jurors.
 Passed.

H. B. 238, Brattain, to fix salary of
 assessor of Lake county. Passed.

H. B. 253, Jones of Clackamas, to
 amend code relating to dental board
 raising fee for examination from \$10
 to \$25. Passed.

H. B. 254, Jones of Clackamas, to
 amend codes relating to dental board
 Passed.

 ator Schofield, to indefinitely post-
 pone, was lost by large majority, and
 the bill will take its regular course.

S. B. 183, Selling, to amend code
 relating to larceny by bailee. Read
 third time and passed.

S. B. 168, Abraham, to relinquish
 all claims of the state to certain land.
 Passed.
