CALKINS PUT ROLLERS UNDER INSURANCE BILL SHOWS HOW THE TRUST COLLECTS THREE OR FOUR TIMES AS MUCH IN OREGON AS IN NEW YORK

Calkins, of Lane county, proved himself one of the best debaters in the house Wednesday. He drove spikes into the ties and fastened down the rails that made it easy for the Bean bill to go safely into the station called "Passed." He told, as a cold fact, that the same company that charged \$10 for a \$2500 policy for five years on a residence in New York, collected \$30 from him on \$2500 for three years at Eugene.

There was an insurance trust in Oregon, and the people knew it. The \$50,000 bonding provision in effect now was the backbone of the trust. This bill was to throw the state open to competition, strike down the trust, let the people have cheaper insurance under the protection of a properly conducted insurance department. Jaeger made a strong fight against the bill, and, but for Calkins, might have won out.

TWO ADDITIONAL JUDGES OF SUPREME COURT HART BILL PASSES HOUSE WITH A FEW DOUBTING ITS CONSTITUTIONALITY PRESENT COMMISSIONERS TO BE APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR

The Hart Bill to create two additional justices of the supreme court stirred the house from its sleepy depths for the first time today. McArthur moved a call of the house and Reynolds alone was absent. The sergeant at arms was sent for him. McArthur recited the history of the bill, showing the need of two supreme justices in addition.

Rusk said there was no call for retaining an emergency clause on this bill. McKinney said a real emergency did exist. He did not fear a referendum. Jones moved to refer

the bill to strike out the emergency clause. Buchanan said the house had once decided the matter, and should stand by its convictions. Jones motion ruled out, and the bill passed.

The yeas were 36, the nays 22, and two absent. Calkins nearly killed the bill by saying he could not vote for it as he believed it unconstitutional, but wanted it to pass.

EVERYTHING GONE BUT HIS WOODEN LEG

Seattle, Feb. 11.—Leroy Lander, 82 years old, is today lamenting the loss of his child wife his 18-month-old baby and, incidentally, 183 new \$20 gold coins. Supported on his crutches, in default of one leg, the old man yesterday hobbled into the prosecuting attorney's room and enlisted the aid of the law to help him locate his missing wife and child. He asked the prosecutor to issue a warrant for the arrest of Bertha Franklin, his wife's sister, to whom he attributes his troubles.

Lander lived on Vashon Island with his young wife and, according to his own story, on Monday last he left her with her sister in the cottage to guard a satchel containing \$3260, while he attended to business matters which necessitated his absence.

On his return he said his wife and baby, his sister-in-law and, incidentally, the money were gone.

On the aged man's complaint a warrant was issued for the arrest of Bertha Franklin and a search warrant was also issued and will be conducted in this city by the mother of the missing girls. Tacoma detectives

were informed that the girls had arrived at the place Monday evening but had left the same night. Lander now believes that his wife and her sister have sailed for Alaska although their names could not be found on the passenger list of any of the vessels sailing for the far north.

AN ELOQUENT AND FORCEFUL LECTURE

The most instructive lecture ever delivered to Salem listeners, business men especially, was given last night by C. C. Chapman, a member of the Chapman Advertising Co., of Portland, on "Personality on Paper," and although the crowd did not materialize in so large numbers, as expected those who did attend were alert to every word of the lecture.

His speech last night will be remembered by the Salem men, who are all expecting him back again before long with another lecture. The Board of Trade meeting was disbanded to hear Chapman speak.

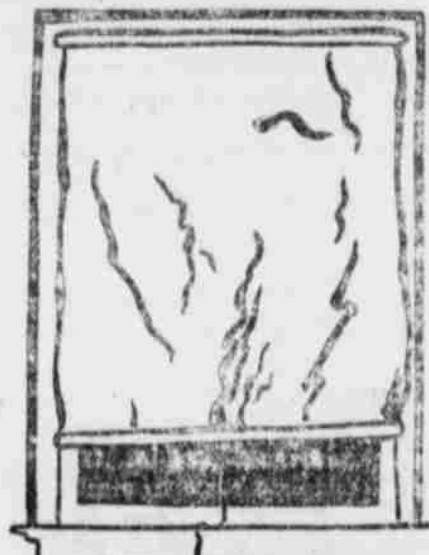
