IRRIGATION CODE LIKE PROHIBITION IS FAR FROM DRY

STATE PRINTER PUT ON A FLAT SALARY AND BOUNTY FOR ALL KINDS OF SCALPS IS ENDORSED.

In the Senate the entire morning was consumed discussing in committee of the whole the irrigation code that has already passed the House. It is bitterly opposed by mining and water interests from section of the state that do not wish to come under state control and regulation. The bill is expected to reach a vote late this afternoon. In the House all proposed constitutional amendments were made a special order for Monday at 2 p. m. A large portrait of General Grant was accepted by the House this morning on behalf of the state. The House passed the bill to put the state printer on a flat salary of \$4000 and create a state printing board composed of the governor, secretary of state and state printer. The scalp bounty bill agreed upon by the Eastern Oregon delegation was put through the House. It provides state bounties to be paid for all the larger varieties of carnivora that prey on sheep and other livestock. The legislature will adjourn this afternoon to participate in the celebrations in honor of Lincoln held in this city and Portland. The State-aided railroad amendment to the constitution and bill to create a citizens commission to carry it into effect are made special order for next Monday.

Senate—Thursday Afternoon.

The afternoon session was called to order at 2 o'clock. The reading and adoption of reports took up most of the afternoon.

H. B. 119, Linenweber, relating to a deputy assessor for Clatsop county. The vote by which the bill failed to pass was reconsidered, and was passed by a vote of 21 to 8, notwithstanding the veto of the governor.

S. B. 194, Schofield, to provide for the funding and refunding of the indebtedness of drainage, levee and protection district. Passed.

S. B. 35, Smith of Umatilla, pertaining to the militia. Passed.

S. B. 114, Mullis, to prohibit the circulation of false reports in regard to standing of banks. Passed.

S. B. 83, Kay, to provide for the payment of \$10 bounty for killing cougars and other wild animals. Passed.

S. B. 205, Smith of Umatilla, to authorize printing for the state board of agriculture. Passed.

S. B. 105, Albee, to define vagrancy and disorderly conduct. Passed.

S. B. 112, Wood, to regulate the sale of commercial food stuffs for live stock. Passed.

S. B. 191, Wood, making it unlawful to throw glass and nails on public highways. Passed. Bingham, Hedges, Miller of Lane and Linn Smith of Umatilla voted no.

S. B. 129, Balley, to amend laws of 1907, relating to tide lands. Passed.

S. B. 220, committee of judiciary, relating to fishing and repealing the two initiated fish laws. Passed. Albee, Selling, Smith of Umatilla voted no.

S. B. 138, Smith of Umatilla, to provide for the formation and organization of new counties and government of same. Passed. Smith of Marlon voted no.

S. B. 222, Josephine delegation, regarding corporations organized for irrigation purposes. Passed.

A large number of senate and house bills were read the first and second times.

Adjourned to 10 p. m.

LOVED THE MOTHER: KILLED DAUGHTER

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Feb. 12.—After failing to persuade the woman with whom he had become infatuated to elope with him, Demitry Dreschenko, a Russian, in revenge, shot and instantly killed her 10-year-old daughter, Dorothy Malokonoff on the street early today. The murder was committed in the sight of a score of persons who rushed toward the infuriated man and endeavored to stay the fusillade of bullets he poured into the prostrate child.

Seeing that his victim was dead, Dreschenko turned his revolver upon himself and fired a shot through his head, before the nearest bystander could reach him. Dreschenko was taken to a hospital in a dying condition.

The little girl was shot by her mother's mad admirer while on her way to school. Dreschenko, spurned by the woman, only the night before, had been waiting for many minutes near her home waiting for the child to pass.

When Dorothy came in sight Dreschenko drew a revolver and the children accompanying Dorothy fled. Several shots were fired, two of them entering the girl's body.

The mother was told by the neighbors of the shooting, and her grief at the sight of her murdered child was pitiful.
