To Do More Paying—
Preparations are now under way at the local rock crushing plant south of the city for starting up at any time. The officials of the paving company are making estimates and figuring on the general work of paving Ferry street between Front and Liberty, and as soon as this work is definitely completed the crushing plant will be set in operation and rock hauled to the plant in Yew Park for cleaning and grading. A large force of men will be required upon the starting of the rock crusher, which will work night and day.

JOHNSON BILL GOES IN SENATE

THE HUGHES SAFETY APPLIANCES

The senate was in session today and killed the last of the labor bill, a measure by Senator Slinnott, of The Dalles, to protect persons engaged in dangerous occupations. The Johnson road bill went through with little opposition, and now goes to the house. It is the most progressive road law yet offered. A number of local and salary bills were passed, one going over the governor's veto. Both houses resume work Monday, the last week of the session.

Safety Appliances Bill.
The Hughes bill for safety gas jets and other appliances to protect human life and property was amended last night in the house, recommitment and reported back to the house for third reading. It will probably get up for passage Monday. Mr. Hughes had the house with him last night, but sharp filibustering tactics, dictated by the Portland gas corporation, made it uphill work. He stood his ground and fought like a tiger to keep the bill on the calendar, and so that it would not lose its place, which he finally accomplished, and the members of the house will have to go on record for or against the safety appliances bill.

BLACK REPUBLIC ON ITS LAST LEGS

Washington, D. C., Feb. 13.—Conditions in Liberia are causing grave concern at the capital according to members of the state department today. It is believed that a crisis in the affairs of the little African republic has been reached and that national existence of Liberia is drawing to a close.

Marines have been landed from a British warship at Monrovia, the capital of Liberia and a column of soldiers has been despatched from Sierra Leone for the purpose of affording protection to English residents and travelers.

The state department here will make renewed efforts to persuade congress to appropriate money for the appointment of a commission to visit Liberia to ascertain conditions and recommend what action should be undertaken by the United States.

MEMORIAL DAY FOR THE MAINE VICTIMS

Washington, D. C., Feb. 13.—Elaborate preparations for memorial exercises to be held at Arlington National Cemetery next Monday in commemoration of the 11th anniversary of the destruction of the Maine are being made here today.

The program for the occasion consists, among other things, of a grand pilgrimage to the cemetery, and memorial meetings during the afternoon and evening.

It is expected that the display of floral offerings will be a feature of the day. President Roosevelt will send a magnificent floral piece and various civic bodies, firms and citizens will contribute flowers.

Flags throughout the city will fly at half mast.

A VICIOUS BLAZE IN SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Feb. 13.—Fire broke out in the Mission branch of the local postoffice early today and before the flames were controlled by the fire department several stores and apartments over them were destroyed. A dozen families were driven into the rain-swept streets in their night clothing and several narrow escapes from serious injuries were reported to the police.

The fires started at 2 o'clock in the morning and by the time the first apparatus arrived had spread from the postoffice to a music store adjoining. Second and third alarms were turned in and the effective work of the firemen prevented the flames from spreading to the Horace Main Grammar school across the street.

While the fire was raging, policemen entered the apartments and sent their occupants scurrying to the street for safety. So fast did the flames spread that little time was afforded for the rescue of valuables. The loss was estimated roughly at \$60,000.

Lobby of Lumbermen.
