It is an act of humanity to a class of unfortunate children who ought not be isolated on a farm seven miles from a city.

The old property of the state in that school will be used by the asylum, **AND IT WILL NOT BE ABANDONED.**

In the same spirit we commend Marion county men who take a stand against striking down educational institutions in other parts of the state.

Marion county people are a unit against removal or abandonment of **ANY INSTITUTION LOCATED AT SALEM.**

Can any Marion county man in the legislature or out of it take the position that he wants to treat another part of the state to a dose that he does not want to take himself?

**WHY STRIKE DOWN OR ABANDON ANY INSTITUTION OF AN EDUCATIONAL CHARACTER?**

If any state institution is not as good as we think it ought to be, make it better. **BUT DO NOT STRIKE DOWN WHAT WE HAVE.**

But do not imagine that Marion county is sacred and holy ground, and that we can have new institutions for old ones **AND AT THE SAME TIME STRIKE DOWN THOSE IN OTHER COUNTIES.**

So far as Marion county is concerned, receiving about three-fourths of all appropriations made in this state, no Marion county member has a moral or political right to **ATTACK OR STRIKE DOWN OR REFUSE TO DECENTLY AND REASONABLY MAINTAIN** any existing state institution in any other part of this state.

The Marion county hog has been long enough thrown in our face.

We have been made the subject of just criticism and unjust criticism before the rest of the state **LONG ENOUGH**, and on behalf of fair-minded people of Marion county this protest is entered.

### SEATTLE LABOR TO AID LEADERS

#### Tailor Gowns for Spring.

Most of the new spring street suits are made of plain materials, though a few striped fabrics are seen. Serge is used a good deal, so also is mohair, which comes with a new silky finish that is very attractive indeed. Panama and cheviot are also employed and of course broadcloth. For more dressy frocks voile is used, while cashmere is a prime favorite with the fashionable dressmakers. The coats of the new tailor suits are cut with the hipless effect and the long straight lines that have been the mode all through the winter. They range from thirty-six to forty-five inches long and are in cut-away style fastening on the chest with two or three buttons and sometimes with only one.

#### Fashionable Fabrics.

Some of the very prettiest of the new materials are made with deep borders of graduated stripes. Many charming cotton fabrics are finished in this way, while the new voiles are given a very elaborate and dressy appearance by a wide border of satin stripes. Foulards are to be worn again and come in lovely conventional patterns on a satin surface. Pongee and tussah silk will also be popular. This spring is to witness

windows, and it is safe to say that few women who see them neglect to buy one or two dress patterns of these practical and pretty wash fabrics.

#### Spring Millinery.

Big hats of chip or leghorn are to be worn a great deal. These are lavishly trimmed with flowers and foliage and occasionally with ostrich plumes or paradise aigrettes. Large turbans are to be fashionable and many trim little hats in toque shape. The new toques of directorio type made entirely of small roses or rosebuds and trimmed with small plumes or aigrettes are one of the very latest novelties. Big chip hats in picture shape are most artistically trimmed with flowers. An unusual but very lovely hat shown at a fashionable milliner's is of pale blue chip, trimmed with violets massed across the front and loops of violet ribbon, while on the left side are two very pale pink crush roses.

Roses of all sizes are special favorites, placed singly around the crowns of large hats, or two in mammoth size and harmonious tints sometimes compose the entire trimming of a small mushroom shape. Lilacs are another favorite garniture, and combined with large, pink roses, the effect is charming.
