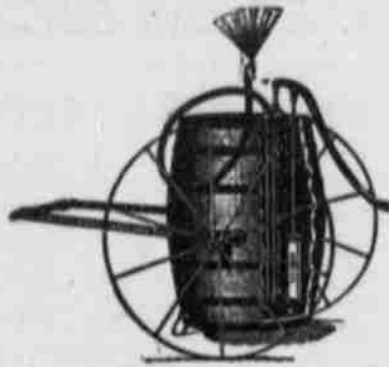

### ACCUSED OF PASSING FORGED CHECKS

Portland, Or., Feb. 13.—Held in a cell of the jail here without bonds, while his beautiful wife is being cared for at the headquarters of the Young Women's Christian Association, John DeLimesay is today awaiting the arrival of officers from Vancouver, B. C., to accompany them back to that city, where, he says, he will prove the charges of forgery against him are false.

DeLimesay refused to discuss his case, but does say he is a member of a prominent and wealthy family in Dayton, Ohio. Attired in the latest fashion, DeLimesay and his wife were taken just as they were about to leave on the Rose City for San Francisco. The local authorities are notified by the Vancouver police that last Saturday DeLimesay passed a dozen alleged worthless checks, aggregating \$100. He was employed there as a clerk in a railroad office.

### UNCLE SAM'S ARMS ARE EXCEEDINGLY LONG

Manila, Feb. 13.—Out of the marshes and thick forests located in the interior of Negros island a force of United States constabulary has brought two of the band of natives accused of murdering H. D. Everett and T. R. Wakeley, both employed in the forestry department of the United States government.

The two men were killed several months ago while engaged in surveying and mapping the island of Lajauna, but until recently no trace of the murderers could be found. The two men under arrest are ring leaders. Uncle Sam will continue the search for the other outlaws, as an example to the hillmen in the island.

### TWENTY THOUSAND ELK STARVING

Cheyenne, Wyo., Feb. 13.—The Wyoming legislature is taking steps to provide protection for the 20,000 elk that are reported to be starving to death in Jackson Hole, Wyo.

The legislators have been informed that the hard crust on the snow in that vicinity prevents the animals from feeding on grass, and at every opportunity attack haystacks. Farmers near Jackson Hole are on guard day and night, protecting their hay.

### MAXIM GORKY UNDER ARREST

St. Petersburg, Feb. 13.—A warrant was issued today for the arrest of Maxim Gorky, the celebrated writer and leader in the revolution movement in Russia.

The substance of the charge against Gorky was not made public, but it is thought that his arrest is the result of political agitation.

## MANY STUDENTS HURT IN BIG CLASS RUSH

Washington, Pa., Feb. 13.—Scores of men students and dozens of co-eds are suffering today from injuries sustained in a clash clash yesterday afternoon when members of the junior class raised their colors on a tower of the main school building.

Each side a number of girls in its ranks. The students and co-eds clashed on the stairs and in the scrimmage several had their clothing ripped and torn. The fight raged through the corridors and class rooms. Members of the faculty attempted to interfere, but were brushed aside. The fighting ceased when both sides became exhausted, but at its conclusion the junior's flag still fluttered on the high mast. Legs and ribs were badly bruised, and all are more or less sore today.

### SAY KLEIN IS DUKE JOHN OF AUSTRIA

Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 13.—Credence is given to a report in circulation here that Joshua Klein, self-styled leader of a "new thought" cult, is Duke John of Austria, who 12 years ago married a woman much below his station in life and came to America. Several years later he was declared legally dead in Austria and nothing more was heard of the man Klein, who is in jail charged with assault and battery upon the mother of one of his pupils, who is in Switzerland at present, today refused to admit or deny that he was the missing duke.

Both Klein and his attorney have frequently declared that they would spring one of the most sensational disclosures Tacoma had heard in years before the end of Klein's trial is reached.

### ACCUSED OF MURDER CLOUGH DISAPPEARS

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 13.—Dwight Clough, an electrical engineer of Los Angeles, who has been in this city since January 23, has disappeared. In Honduras an accusation of homicide has been placed against him. Clough advertised some time ago for men to accompany him on a gold hunting expedition. Among those who accompanied Clough from Los Angeles was Jefferson D. Eller, who shortly after the party reached their destination was found dead in the woods, shot under conditions that suggested foul play. Clough returned to Los Angeles where he told that Eller's death was due to accident. Clough later went to Victoria, B. C., and after remaining there a short time came to this city.

Clough's attorney in this city avows the innocence of his client and attributes the action of the government of Honduras in accusing Rockwell, who was also a member of the ill-fated gold expedition.

The evidence upon which the government has requested Clough's extradition was collected mainly by a J. Eller, brother of the man who was shot and resides in Madera, Calif.

### WOMEN TO GET ON POLICE FORCE

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 13.—The encroachments of the "new woman" is becoming serious, even the police force now being invaded by the gentler sex. The city council finance committee has recommended for passage a council bill to appropriate \$175 a month with which to pay the salary and the expenses of a woman police officer. This action was taken upon the request of Miss May Walker, secretary of the Young Women's Christian association.

The proposed woman officer will have police powers. Her duties will be to advise young girls and women who come to the city during the fair against the dangers which threaten them. She will have authority to investigate cases and enter saloons, cafes and hotels whenever she deems it necessary.

#### Steamer Sinks; Nine Drown.

Brest, France, Feb. 13.—The British steamer Forest Castle foundered off the harbor today. Nine of the crew were drowned.

The proposed American exposition to be held in London next year has been thoroughly organized and special efforts are being made to secure exhibit from the western part of this country.

### CELEBRATION AT METHODIST CHURCH

One of the most impressive ceremonies in commemoration of the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, the great war president and emancipator, was held in the Methodist church yesterday afternoon by the members of the Grand Army of the Republic and Women's Relief Corps. At 1:30 o'clock the members of the post, veterans of the Civil, Spanish and Indian wars and the ladies of the Relief Corps entered in a body and were seated in the center of the auditorium. D. W. Matthews, post commander of the G. A. R., presided. The program opened with "America" by the audience, led by the quartet composed of Mrs. W. Carleton Smith, Mrs. V. P. Babcock, Wm. McGilchrist and George H. Burnett, whose excellently rendered patriotic songs were a pleasing feature.

Mrs. Percy Cotter gave a splendid reading of "Oh, Why Should the Spirit of Mortal Be Proud?" Lincoln's favorite poem, which was followed by an address by Hon. George H. Burnett. He spoke of the great support and sacrifices which the wearers of the blue had given to their country and their assistance to Lincoln in his time of greatest need, and of Lincoln's character and place in the hearts of the American people. No man had ever attained and held the confidence of the people as Lincoln. That his great object was to save the Union and give every man a fair chance.

Probably the most interesting speaker was D. C. Eley of the Eleventh Iowa regiment and a personal friend of the great president. He told of many personal experiences, many reminiscences of the life of Lincoln, whom he met at the University of Illinois at Springfield, in 1854, and many times afterward at social and political gatherings. His talk was interesting throughout and he was given the closest attention. Of Lincoln's family his son Robert is living, and a prominent lawyer of Chicago.

Hon. D. W. Webster read Lincoln's Gettysburg address and addresses followed by Rev. Philip Bauer of the First Congregational church and Rev. W. H. Selleck of the First M. E. church. Mr. Bauer spoke of Lincoln as a practical idealist and the man of sorrow, but also the man of good cheer. Mr. Selleck spoke of Lincoln as the Christian, and showed the great and tender nature of the greatest man of the nineteenth century.

Rev. Paul S. Bandy of the Unitarian church delivered the invocation and Rev. P. S. Knight the benediction.

### MEMBERS WORKED TILL LIGHTS WENT OUT

The house and senate sat until late at night Friday. The house passed 36 bills and indefinitely postponed four. The senate did about as much, and is in session today. A great many of the members went to Eugene to celebrate Admission Day at the State University. Admission Day will be observed at Salem at the State Capitol Monday, with a joint session and an elaborate program.

### ANDREW HARRISON BURNED TO DEATH

Andrew Harrison, formerly of Jefferson, this county, was burned to death at his home near Boring, Clatsop county, while clearing land. He was about 50 years old, and one of the old students of Willamette University. He was an uncle of Representative McKinney of Baker county, who was notified of the accident.
