H. B. 304, Brady, to amend local option law. Killed.

H. B. 256, Philpot, amends law apportioning school fund. Passed.

H. B. 178, Orton, to guaranty bank deposits. Failed.

H. B. 355, Carter, relating to irrigation districts. Passed.

H. B. 343, Muncy, relating to hunters' licenses in Coos and Curry counties for non-residents. Killed.

BRADY'S BILL TREATED WITH DISCOURTESY

HE HAD THIRTY-SEVEN MAGNIFICENT PROMISES WHICH DWINDLED DOWN TO SEVENTEEN

House Bill 304, to amend the local option law, was the cause of a hot debate yesterday.

Buchanan moved indefinite postponement.

McCue said members had a right to debate this bill, as well as a prohibition measure.

Brady said about 37 members had promised to vote for this bill, but promises were like egg shells. He wanted the 37 to have a chance to crack their shells.

Buchanan said this bill was more favorable to the liquor interests than the Ready bill, that was voted down two years ago.

Brady said if a precinct went dry now it stayed dry two years. If it went wet it only stayed wet a year before another election had to be held. Was that American fair play.

Calkins said the bill did not fit in to the local option. He was opposed to considering it in committee of the whole. He did not want to amend it or vote on amendments.

Brady moved a call of the house. A great many of the 37 had faded away into the lobbies, and were reluctantly dragged back by Assistant Doorkeeper Singer.

The noes were: Reddilion, Bean, Brady, Brooke, Clemens, Couch, Davis, McCue, McDonald, Meek, Muncy, Orton, Patton, Purdin, Smith, McArthur, 17.

The rest voted aye, 35. Absent, 8.
