WORKED HIS WAY INTO THE JAIL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Portland, Or., Feb. 18.—The local police authorities are today investigating a strange story told by a prisoner—a young man who says his name is George M. Morgan, and who claims to be the son of a New York City broker, a Columbia University graduate of 1902, and a famous football player.

Morgan fell into the hands of the police on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a 17-year-old girl. He declares that after he had spent a fortnight in reckless living, he was cast aside by his father. He then started out, he says, to show the world what he could do, but failed to get by Portland's city jail.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC MAY HAVE BIG STRIKE

Galveston, Texas, Feb. 18.—Conductors of the New Orleans to San Francisco branch of the Southern Pacific railroad balloted until early today without arriving at a decision as to whether their union shall strike against the discharge of a fellow employee.

The trouble arose when a conductor on the El Paso division, who served as a member of a grievance committee of trainmen, was discharged for insubordination after a conference with a Southern Pacific official. The conductors held that the man was being paid by the order and not by the railroad and that therefore could not be discharged for that cause.

Other affiliated railway trainmen's organizations have indicated that they would join the conductors if a strike is ordered, and there is a possibility that the trouble may spread throughout the entire Southern Pacific system.

Mrs. Hetzel Is Drowned.

Corvallis, Or., Feb. 18.—The body of Mrs. H. Hetzel, mother of Professor R. D. Hetzel of O. A. C., was found floating in the Willamette today. While in a delirious condition she strayed from her home in this city Tuesday afternoon or that night. No trace of her was found until N. W. Newton went to his boat landing about noon.

The woman had stepped into a boat there, pulled off her gloves, and either fell or jumped to her death. Her clothing caught in willows about the boat and these held her safe from the current. The condition of the body indicated that the unfortunate woman had been in the water most of the time since her disappearance. No inquest was held.

Big Jap Arrives.

CLEANER MILK, PURER CREAM, SWEETER DAIRIES AND A LITTLE POLITICS ALL IN ONE BILL

The general dairy act that State Food and Dairy Commissioner Bailey, E. T. Judd and others have been working on for the whole session, struck a rock and went down Wednesday for lack of votes. The bill is aimed to secure inspection of dairies and creameries, greater cleanliness and purer milk and cream. Incidentally it provides a few deputies who may assist in making chief dairy boss governor.

The votes were Apiegate, Barrett, Bean, Heddlon, Bones, Branden, Campbell, Corrigan, Dimick, Farrell, Greer, Hattburg, Hines, Hughes, Jackson, Jones of Douglas, Jones of Clackamas, Libby, Mahoney, Mann, Martner, McCue, McKinney, Meek, Miller, Muncy, Munkers, Orton, Patton, Philpot, Purdin, Richardson, 33. The bill will probably be reconsidered.

VIKING TO VISIT SEATTLE FAIR

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Feb. 18.—To build a Viking ship, fully equipped and man it with picked Norwegians of the Northwest, take it across Lake Washington and land at the Alaska-Yukon Pacific exposition grounds on August 30, which is Norway day at the fair, is the plan of the Pacific Coast Sangerforbund and other Norwegian societies of the coast.

The little plan, symbols of a story

of the ninth century, will be enacted in connection with the voyage of the ship. A king will be chosen by the picked Norsemen. He will appoint nobles, craftsmen and seamen, and will command the ship on its trip to the fair grounds.

In the large amphitheatre the king will wed a princess, previously selected, and she will then become his queen. The queen will be accompanied by 500 ladies in waiting, dressed in the national costume of Norway.
