**HISTORY OF THE CONSERVATION MOVEMENT.**

The great movement for the conservation of natural resources has become world-wide.

It is a national movement headed by the President **AND BACKED BY THE PRESIDENT-ELECT.**

It is a state movement in Oregon with a Conservation Commission and the Governor back of it.

This legislature has backed the conservation program by enacting the Eaton law to lease **WATERPOWERS OWNED BY THE STATE.**

That law is expected to produce \$100,000 a year revenues for the school funds **INSIDE OF TEN YEARS.**

This is only an incident of the conservation program.

The conservation of the natural resources will become the greatest source of wealth **AND REVENUES TO THE STATE.**

The public is not aware that this movement really had its first practical inception in Oregon.

A few years ago the University of Oregon made a survey of the waterpowers on the Santiam and McKenzie rivers.

Those reports showed an enormous waterpower, millions of horsepower, in those streams still owned by the state, but liable to private appropriation or **TO BE FILED BY CORPORATIONS AT ANY TIME.**

Representative Killingsworth of Portland got a committee appointed to report on the extent of these unused waterpowers.

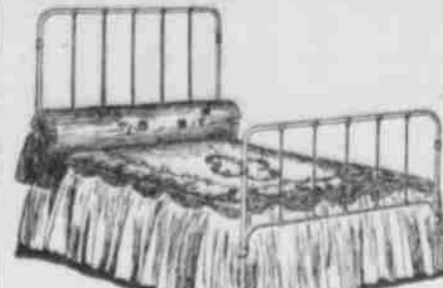

**APPROPRIATIONS BY LEGISLATURE ARE ABOUT \$3,500,000**

Appropriations originating in the senate and passed by both houses were as follows:

Improving the quality of milk, butter, cream and cheese, \$12,000; banks and banking, \$20,000; Linn county fair association, \$1000; Eastern Oregon agricultural station at Union, Ore., \$30,000; annual support state agricultural college, \$1,000; appropriation for purchase of land, buildings and equipment for salmon hatcheries, \$20,000; state agricultural college, \$50,000; central hatchery on Columbia river, \$15,000; armories for Oregon National guard, \$40,000; conservation commission, prescribing its duties, etc., \$1000; protection of salmon and sturgeon in Columbia river, \$1000; Oregon City locks, extending time (returns \$200,000 to general fund), \$300,000; state board of agriculture, appropriation for \$15,000 annually, \$30,000; state fair grounds sewerage system, etc., \$25,000; state sanatorium, \$70,000; insane asylum, \$350,964.

Total senate appropriations, \$1,062,964.

Appropriations in the house and passed by both houses were as follows:

Experiment station Umatilla irrigation project, support of \$6000;

Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, additional appropriation for, \$25,000; codifying the statutes, appropriation for, \$25,000; state board of tax commissioners, creating appropriations for, \$26,000; prosecuting attorneys and deputies, increase or salaries, \$1000; state agricultural college, \$210,000; bridge across Snake river, \$15,000; state board of health, adding veterinary, \$12,000; seal bounty, \$40,000; state engineer and assistants, \$10,000; Yamhill county fair association, \$1000; state board to equalize taxes, \$5000; reimburse G. H. Small, \$280; reclamation desert land, \$5000; bureau labor statistics inspector of factories and workshops, \$4800; expenses of the State Horticultural society, 1909, 1910, \$1000; state road from Pacific ocean to Idaho boundary, \$100,000; Grange Fair association at Gresham, \$1000; state portage railway, \$15,000 branch insane asylum in Eastern Oregon, \$200,000; Martha S. Lane, relief of, \$150; bank examiner, \$12,000; Clackamas county fair, \$1000; deficiency appropriation bill, \$104,266; deaf mute school, \$75,000; Boys' and Girls' Aid, Crittenden home, Patton home, Baby home, \$37,618.35; Oregon Historical Society, \$5000; additional deficiency, \$81,188.
