## LEGISLATURE GOOD, BUT HABITS ARE BAD

[United Press Leased Wire.] Sacramento, Feb. 23.—That members of California's legislature have been daily consuming gallons of liquor furnished them within the capitol building by the enemies of local option, and in so doing, violating laws of this state which prohibit intoxicants being sold or given away on the capitol grounds or within the state building, was the startling declaration made today by Rev. D. M. Grandier of Los Angeles, who is here representing the Anti-Saloon League in the fight for the passage of local option bills.

For weeks, in fact ever since the present session of the legislature began, buffets where whiskey and beer are given away freely, have been openly conducted at the capitol. Behind curtains in the offices of Sergeant-at-Arms Stafford of the assembly and Sergeant-at-Arms, Martin of the senate, sideboards where "booze" is as free as water, are being maintained.

Every day a constant stream of legislators pour into these little rooms and there indulge to the extent of their various and respective capacities. It was generally believed that Stafford and Martin were "standing treat" in return for the fat jobs which they have been given by the legislature.

And then a day or so ago the rumor went out that the refreshments were being provided by the liquor interests which are endeavoring to defeat the local option bills pending in both houses. Now comes Rev. Grandier with the statement that he knows of no person or persons except the liquor people who would be at this time keeping the representatives in the assembly and senate in good spirits. It has been estimated that \$25 and \$30 worth of liquor is consumed daily by the members of both houses.

The hilarity of certain solons alone in the afternoon of each day and the conditions of inebriety some of them are in at the close of a day's session would tend to prove that the estimate is not far-fetched.

Rev. Grandier brands the state of affairs at the capitol a disgrace and an outrage. He said today:

"I think it is an outrage on decency and a disgrace to the state for the assembly and senate to permit such things to go on. Aside from being a disgrace this giving away of liquor in the capitol is unlawful.

"Section 172 of the penal code prohibits the sale or distribution of liquor in the capitol building. The liquor interests and the enemies of local option are the only ones who would dare to or would care to supply intoxicants to the legislators at this time.

"As far as I can see, the members of the legislature are breaking laws instead of making them. They must know that the penal code prescribes penalties for such offenses as are being perpetrated at the capitol. An end should be put to the disgraceful condition of affairs at once."
