**HON. JOHN H. SCOTT GOES TO PORTLAND**

Judge Scott and wife will remove to Portland in a few days, where he has taken a position with the Jacob Stine Co., real estate men. He has a farm of 160 acres near Ike Needham and a large tract of timber land near Marion, and some property near Gervais. He was county judge for eight years, and will now become a resident of Portland, along with Frank W. Powers and J. R. Shepard, with the same firm.

Judge Scott was a graduate of the Michigan law school, and settled in Salem a poor young man, but very soon was elevated to the office of county judge. He became very active in good roads matter, and for several years has been president of the state association. In the legislature just closed he had introduced and worked hard for the Johnson road law, and if it had passed the house would probably have been appointed at the head of the good roads commission on a salary of \$3000 a year. The salary he has received as county judge was a beggarly one of \$1200 a year, on which a man could hardly make a living. But by economy and close attention to private business Judge Scott has accumulated considerable property. He regrets very much to leave Salem, and says he will always have a warm spot in his heart for this city.

A damage and injunction suit has been filed in the circuit court by G. W. Schindler and C. D. Hartman against Frank Haskle, et al.
