**BOULEVARD TO THE STATE FAIR GROUNDS**

**JOINT COMMITTEE OF CITY COUNCIL AND BOARD OF TRADE MAKE A REPORT DEFINING THE ROUTE TO BE FOLLOWED**

The committees which have been working on the matter are prepared to submit the following report to the city council:

To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon.

Gentlemen: We, the undersigned committees of your honorable body and of the Salem Board of Trade, who were appointed for the purpose of investigating a feasible route for a boulevard from the city to the state fair grounds, hereby beg leave to report.

After spending considerable time on the ground and acquiring all the information possible, we concluded to recommend either of the following routes, subject to the future approval of your honorable body, or such committees as may be appointed for that purpose:

First—It is proposed to go north from Court street on Capitol street as far as the Garden road; thence through the L. C. McCoy property to what is known as the Tile Works road, following the line of Capitol street; thence easterly on the Tile Works road to a point about 200

feet beyond the S. P. right of way; thence northerly parallel with the S. P. right of way into the fair grounds.

Second—North from Court street on Capitol street to the north line of the L. C. McCoy tract; thence easterly to a point about 200 feet west of the S. P. right of way to the Tile Works road; thence same as above.

Your committees would respectfully request that your honorable body appoint a permanent committee to act in conjunction with a like committee from the commercial organizations of the city, who shall ascertain and report back to your body some plan for devising ways and means to accomplish this much desired end.
