

COOS AND CURRY COUNTIES AS SHOWN BY HON I. N. MUNCY

A MILLION ACRES AWAITING SETTLEMENT AND THE GREATEST AND RICHEST BODIES OF MINERAL EVER FOUND IN THE WORLD

As per notice heretofore given in The Journal, Hon. I. N. Muncy last night delivered a lecture on the subject: "Coos and Curry Counties, and Their Inducement for a Greater Oregon." Owing to the stormy condition of the weather, the attendance was rather light, but those present were certainly given a treat. Mr. Muncy was introduced by Hon. W. H. Holmes, with a short but happily worded talk, which put everybody in a receptive mood for Mr. Muncy's lecture. We have used the word "lecture," but it is hardly proper, he just got next his audience and talked good, hard horse sense, and lots of it. He suggested that heretofore the money of the West had gone to build up the East, but now that the money of the East was flooding out this way to build up the West, because it got bigger, better and quicker returns.

He advised everyone to get hold of Oregon land, a farm, if possible, a town lot, anyway, and some mining and timber land, if possible.

He stated that Coos and Curry counties had a million acres awaiting some one to come and own it. That a line of railroad was projected from east of the mountains (Klamath I believe) down Rogue river to Grants Pass, thence across to the head of the Illinois river, down that to the Rogue again, and thence on to Wedderburn or Gold Beach.

He described this section as being the great apple belt, with the ocean washing along the edges of the orchards and the world for a market. "As to climate," said he, "it is too far north to be warm, and too far south to be cold, and hence it is the best in the world."

He gave a graphic picture of the great wealth of timber, the salmon industry, the possibilities of dairying, etc.; but it was when he began to talk of the mines of Southern Oregon that the audience began to sit up and wonder if Mr. Muncy was rubbing Aladdin's lamp and conjuring up a garden of gems and jewels.

Mr. Muncy is a practical miner, and is not a dreamer, and yet one cannot realize the vastness or richness of the ore bodies, as he describes them. But in the face of any doubt that might arise Mr. Muncy shows a big specimen to make the eyes give credence to what the ears have heard. He has samples of native copper, bismite, cobalt, antimony and tellurium ores that are fabulously rich, and that must have come from Coos and Curry, because there are none like them anywhere else.

Mr. Muncy's lecture was a treat, and the only drawback it had was that there was not more to hear it.

He is still in Salem, and may remain for several days, if the incoming governor, Benson, should conclude to call a special session of the legislature.

GIVES JAPS A REST JUMPS ON MORMONS

Sacramento, Cal., Feb. 25.—Assemblyman Grove L. Johnson has hit the legislature in a new spot today through the introduction of his resolution calling upon other state legislatures to join California in petitioning congress to call a convention for the purpose of preparing an amendment to the constitution prohibiting polygamy.

Johnson has attacked the Japanese unsuccessfully, and now he is hot on the trail of the Mormons. Nearly 2000 members of that sect are living on a colony at Gridley in Butte county, and Johnson knows of similar colonies in other portions of the state. He says that he introduced his resolution at the request of Mrs. Hester T. Griffith of Los Angeles.

NEGRO WAITRESSES GET IN A MIX-UP

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 25.—Passengers on the Oakland ferry-boat Piedmont were thrown into a panic early today when three young negroes engaged in a fight with knives in the woman's cabin of the boat.

The fight raged several minutes before deck hands arrived. When they came Mamie Gardner was lying unconscious from a stab, while Dollie Townsend was endeavoring to disarm Viola Hill. The woman wounded was taken to the Harbor Hospital in a serious condition, while the other two women were arrested.

They gave their profession as waitresses, and said they were returning from a dance. It is believed the trouble started over the attentions paid one of them by a negro at the dance.

ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR THE HORSE FAIR

SAYS LOCAL OPTION IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL

[United Press Leased Wire.] Sacramento, Feb. 25.—That local option bills introduced in the legislature by Senator Estuillo and Assemblyman Wyllie are unconstitutional is feared today by a large number of legislators who have been studying the law in the case.

Senator Martinelli has gone to the trouble of preparing an elaborate brief on the question, proving to his own satisfaction and that of a number of his colleagues, that the principle of local option "is un-American and undemocratic," and contrary to the institutions of the people of this country.

Martinelli says that the power to make laws has been entrusted through state and federal legislatures to legislative bodies, and it would require nothing less than a constitutional amendment to alter existing laws now covering the rights of the people. Martinelli says that all the voice which the voters can now have to settle "wet" and "dry" questions under the constitution is to elect supervisors pledged to a "no-license" policy.

NEBRASKA ADOPTS THE OREGON PLAN

[United Press Leased Wire.] Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 25.—The senate today passed a bill providing for the election of United States senators under the Oregon plan. It has already passed the house and the governor will sign it.

Mrs. Emma Jones Dead.

Mrs. Emma Jones, of Jefferson, Ore., died at her home in that city this morning at 7:30 of Bright's disease, at the age of 61 years and 4 months.

Mrs. Jones is one of the old pioneers of Oregon, being one of the three who now survive from the emigration train of 150 coming to this state in the year 1853 from Indiana. Mrs. Jones was born in Indiana in 1847, and crossed the plains with her parents, Rev. J. W. Short and wife, locating in the Waldo Hills, where she became acquainted with and married J. W. Jones, who died 12 years ago. Mrs. Jones later moved to Jefferson, where she has resided for several years.

Eight children survive Mrs. Jones, Charles Jones, of Salem; Louis A. Jones, of Astoria; John L. Jones, of Jefferson; W. F. Jones, of Jefferson; Geo. W. Jones, of Jackson; Mrs. Kate E. May ones, of Jefferson; Mrs. Kate Smith, of Chicago, and Mrs. Lulu E. Wied, of Jefferson. One brother, Wm. Short, survives her.

The funeral arrangements will be announced later.

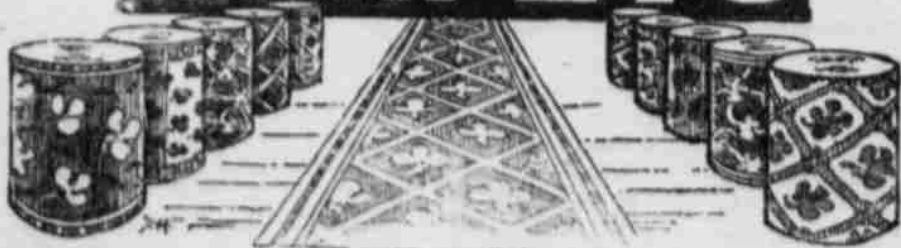
