BAND MASTERS DISAGREE ABOUT INAUGURAL MUSIC

New York, March 1.—Bandmasters throughout the United States today expressed their opinions as to the most fitting air to be played as the musicians in the inaugural parade next Thursday pass Mr. Taft's reviewing stand. The airs selected range from "On the Banks of the Wabash" to "Dixie."

"Dixie" was chosen by Charles Urig, drum major of the crack First Kentucky Infantry band at Louisville.

From Cincinnati comes the report that John C. Weber selected "Auld Lang Syne," and George E. Smith, another noted leader, proposed to play "Sweethearts," as a tribute to both the president-elect and his wife.

"Honey Boy," as typical of the Taft smile, was the selection of Joseph C. Lauder, composer and bandmaster at Milwaukee.

"Johnnie" Hand at Chicago believes that "This is no time for mirth nor laughter; the cold gray dawn of the morning after," the refreshing refrain on "Remorse" in the Sultan of Sulu, would be appropriate, while Gypsy Rido suggests the "Yankee Consul's" ditty "Ain't it funny what a difference just a few hours make."

"Rainbow" is the favorite of the Philadelphia leaders, while the upstate bandmasters have selected "Pennsylvania" as the official anthem.

"Be-Eye-Double-Eli—Bill—Taft is no counterfeit bill," is suggested by George H. Green of Omaha.

Professor Ernestino of Indianapolis believes "On the Banks of the Wabash" would be appropriate, and Jacob I. Wilk of Minneapolis suggests Julian Edwards' "My Own United States."

AUSTIN TELLS A STRANGE STORY

Little Rock, Ark., March 1.—The story of C. R. Austin, formerly an official of the Mineral Springs bank, that he was compelled to rob the bank by a masked man and then leave for Europe, is being investigated today by the bank officials. Austin was recently acquitted of a charge of embezzling \$40,000 of the bank's funds.

Austin said that he went to the bank on the night of December 28, 1907, and was confronted by a masked man, who at the point of a revolver compelled him to hand over the bank's money and sign a contract to go to Europe. He was told to remain in Europe until August, 1908, and that he would be killed if he did not keep the contract.

After Austin had departed suspicion was directed to him away from the real thief. Austin declared that he returned to the United States as soon as he dared, and gave himself up.

WATCHING TO STOP CHINESE SMUGGLING

New York, March 1.—The customs officials today are taking extra precautions against the importation by an "underground" of Chinese coolies, following the discovery yesterday of an attempt to smuggle coolies into the country by a purser of the steamship Prince Sigismund of the Atlas line.

These Chinese were arrested at the pier by an inspector of the customs service. They were redressed in American clothing and wore queues concealed beneath their hats. They will be deported.

It is alleged that many attempts at smuggling have been made by steamship officers during the last year and a concerted effort will be made to stop the traffic.

TRYING TO SPIKE THE CONGRESSIONAL CANNON

[United Press Leased Wire.] New York, March 1.—Discussing a reply made public by Speaker Cannon, the first response from the speaker since various publications have attacked him, Edward Higgins, president of "Success" Magazine, said today:

"The speaker must be getting nervous. What we want is the downfall of Cannonism. He has built up a machine and changed the representative government to despotism. His methods are based on the principles of log-rolling. Rewards go to the faithful.

"Our purpose is to stiffen the insurgent movement, and defeat Cannon for re-election to the speakership at the special session next month."

Higgins said that he hoped to swing the 20 odd Republican vote needed into line for Cannon's overthrow.

THE OUTCOME OF LESE MAJESTE LAWS

[United Press Leased Wire.] Chicago, March 1.—Plans were completed today for the arrest of Delavan Smith, of Lake Forest, owner of the Indianapolis News, in connection with the indictments recently brought against him in Washington, charging him with libel in publishing a series of articles on the so-called Panama canal scandal.

Smith will probably be arrested in Chicago, and will appear for a hearing before Judge Landis, before being removed to Washington for trial. The arrest will be a formal one.

HIS OPINION OF TEDDY STAYS ON RECORD

Washington, March 1.—The denunciation of President Roosevelt by Congressman Cook of Colorado will remain a record of the house of representatives, according to a report today by a special committee appointed to consider the question of expunging it from the record.

The committee which was appointed last week reported that the speech, taken as a whole, does not contain any language that is a violation of the privileges of debate. The committee's recommendation that it be retained in the record was adopted by a viva voce vote.

KAUFMAN WANTS TO MEET JEFFRIES

[United Press Leased Wire.] Los Angeles, March 1.—Al Kaufman is earnest in his desire today to meet Jim Jeffries for the heavyweight championship of the world. Billy Delaney, Kaufman's handler, throws down the gauntlet to the big white champion in the following letter, written to Baron Long, matchmaker for the Jeffries Fight Club:

"Dear Baron: Friends of mine in New York are ready to back Kaufman against Jeffries for \$10,000, and have posted a forfeit of \$1000 cash in the hands of Al Smith, the veteran stakeholder of that city.

"Kaufman will not meet Jack Johnson at present, the big negro will keep. Al does want to fight Jeff though. Johnson will soon be in this country crowding Jeffries, and the only way Jim can avoid meeting him is to take on Kaufman, or else admit that he (Jeffries) is a dead one.

"Jim will positively have to show his hand, and if he don't fight he will have to give up the show business. Kaufman and Jeffries battling for a stake of \$20,000 would be a great card and I hope that Jeff will not attempt anything silly like telling Al to go and get a reputation.

"As an inducement for Jeffries to meet Al we will agree to fight him in his own city before his own club, will allow a Los Angeles man to referee and bet him the \$10,000 on the side that Kaufman wins. Jeffries can have all the doubts concerning the genuineness of the side bet removed from his mind as soon as he sets foot in New York city."

ALASKA TOWN IS SHY OF GIN

[United Press Leased Wire.] Seattle, Wash., March 1.—Fairbanks, Alaska, is, according to advices received here, beset with a shortage of gin. Kerosene costs \$17 a case, but that only furnishes light. Gin furnishes light, heat and happiness in the frigid zone where gold is plentiful, but where essentials of life are scarce. Eggs are selling at \$60 a case in the Tanana metropolis. Sugar is worth 40 cents a pound. Other articles are short. But gin, so necessary to the good cheer of the mines, is short, and there is much anxiety in the mining camp. Aid has been requested and relief expeditions will be hurried to the stricken city from other camps, whose supply of liquid necessities are ample.
