Big Price for Salem Lands—

One of the most valuable transfers, considering acreage, recorded on the books at the court house was made today by C. P. and K. E. Lyod to Wm. R. Beckett, consideration \$7000. The property sold is located east of this city on the Asylum Farm road, and contains but 20 acres, for which Mr. Beckett paid \$350 per acre. There is now standing on the farm five acres of class No. 1 Royal Ann cherries, 10 acres of high grade apples and five acres of English walnuts. When one considers that the

price paid for cherries in this city is from 3 to 5 cents per pound and \$1 per box for apples, notwithstanding the excellent price paid for walnuts all over the world, \$7000 is not an exorbitant price to pay for the land in question.

Damaged, But Wants More—

A petition has been filed in the county court by H. H. Tompkins, a mail carrier, on a rural route in the Sublimity district, asking that the court pay damages in the sum of \$110 for adenitis he alleges to have resulted to him from a defective culvert. In itemizing the costs of the injuries the petition asks for \$50 for damages to wagon, \$50 for personal injuries and \$10 for expenses. The court will look into the matter at the next meeting.

Wants the Difference—

E. A. Finney has filed a complaint in the circuit court against A. D. Smith, a store keeper at Brooks, Ore., claiming that he bought goods from Smith for \$500, when the actual amount of the purchase only amounted to \$350. The complaint asks the court to award him \$150, the difference between the price paid and the real value of the goods. John H. McNary and C. L. McNary appear for the plaintiff.

A Great Missionary—

Both will lecture in the church in the afternoon to women only, and the doctor will lecture on general missionary work in Korea at 7:30 in the evening, to which the public is cordially invited. Dr. Underwood probably has a greater influence than any one over the present emperor of Korea. At the time of the emperor's baptism by Dr. Underwood he said that if he wished it, he would command the whole of his empire to be baptised into the Christian faith. Dr. Underwood told him, "No, I couldn't do that. I only want those who are sincerely converted." The church choir and orchestra will assist in the evening meeting.

WASHINGTON HAS A NORMAL SCHOOL ROW

[United Press Leased Wire.] Bellingham, Wash., March 1.—Of from acting Governor Hay that the scandal that has developed in the Bellingham normal school will be fully probed by the state. Hay declares that the charges against Dr. E. T. Mathes, principal of the normal, that he is incompetent and has misappropriated state funds, are the most serious presented from any of the state schools. Hay has instructed Assistant Attorney General Von Tanager to be present in the city March 6, when the official investigation of the affairs in the school will be conducted by the board of trustees.
