

STEREOPTICON VIEWS AT  
SALEM HIGH TONIGHT

The students and friends of Salem high school will have the opportunity this evening of being entertained in a manner both unique and highly instructive, when Prof. J. P. Leotsakos of the University of Athens will speak in the assembly room of the high school building on "Greece, Ancient and Modern."

Professor Leotsakos was born in Sparta, and thoroughly Greek in education and sympathies, he sees matters from a Greek viewpoint. His father was the commander of the revolutionary army that brought about the deposition of King Otto in 1862, afterwards aid-de-camp to the present King George, and finally senator from Lakonia in the Greek parliament at Athens. Professor Leotsakos is a graduate of the Royal Classical College of Athens and a "teleiofotios" of the law department of the University of Athens. He speaks Greek fluently and English with a mere trace of foreign accent. His lecture deals with the most interesting and important features of Greek history from ancient to modern times, with the art and literature of classic Greece, to the institutions and customs of the present day. The lecture has been delivered in many cities and colleges of the United States and has everywhere been most enthusiastically received. The charming personality of the man combined with the intensely interesting subject matter of his lecture insure for all who attend an evening of pleasure and profit.

Professor Leotsakos carries with him one hundred fine stereopticon views, which add much to the charm and vividness of his address. Favorable comment on the professor and his lecture comes from various newspapers of the country, some of which we quote below:

Senators: Again a new administration succeeds to the control of national affairs in conformity with the will of the people, expressed in the sovereign capacity, under the orderly processes of the law. We witness the impressive transference of national power in accordance with their will deliberately recorded, with increased respect for our institutions. We indulge the fervent hope that the administration which assumes authority under such agreeable auspices will meet in full measure our national needs; that we may continue in happy accord with the powers of the world; that peace, contentment and progress may prevail throughout our borders, and that our country may grow in material strength; and more than that and better than that, that education, morality, justice and patriotism, which are our chief sources of pride, may continue to increase among our people.

It now becomes my duty to take final leave of you, and in doing so I beg to return to you my profoundest thanks for the resolution which you have just adopted, personal to myself. To receive a vote of your approval without division is an honor which I shall carry with me to the end of my days and transmit to my children as a priceless legacy.

In these latter days much severe criticism is heard of the senate of the United States, but it has always been so since the time of our fathers, and that it will continue I have no doubt. The record of the senate, to which its present membership has contributed, is made and is beyond recall. I know of none better made by any legislative assembly anywhere. In my judgment it will stand comparison with the record of the senate in its elder days. It has been written by men learned in the science of government, inspired by as patriotic purposes as actuated their illustrious predecessors.

The senate of the United States must remain an important part of a thoroughly independent, co-ordinate branch of the government, neither arrogating to itself functions not devolved upon it under the constitution, nor, upon the other hand, subtracting from its legitimate powers. Its legislative duties are vast, while its duties with respect to treaties and appointments to the public service are of very great moment. A servile senate was not contemplated by its founders. The senate is today as jealous as ever of its proper dignity and its just powers and as worthy as ever of the popular respect and confidence.

## Bought a Home—

Another real estate transfer took place yesterday, with a consideration of \$5500. The property in question formerly belonged to Wm. Holmes, a prominent Salem attorney, but Eugene Eckert bought the place, which is at the corner of Center and Winter streets. The Holmes property is considered first-class, and will make a splendid home.

## Yew Park Push Club—

The Yew Park Push Club met last night and organized, with H. S. Radcliff as president, and Charles Goodale as secretary. A committee of five will be appointed by Mr. Radcliff shortly to draw up by-laws for the club. The improvement of 12th street from Mill to the city limits was favored at the meeting, and a petition will be presented at the next meeting of the city council for help in this matter.

## Salem Man at Inauguration—

J. P. Rogers, the well-known Salem capitalist, and family were in Washington, D. C., yesterday attending the great inauguration ceremonies. It is probable that Mr. Rogers enjoyed the scenes immensely, but his friends in this city are willing to take a bet that he wished he was in Oregon again, where one does not have to carry so many clothes. While in California Mr. Rogers purchased a big bubble car, which is now stored away in the Moyer machine shop here.

It requires no gift of prophecy to foretell that many varied and complex questions will come here for solution in the not very distant future—questions which will have a potential bearing upon the very structure of republican government and an important influence upon our social and industrial systems. To you who shall remain, and to your successors, the country will look, and I believe it will look with confidence, for a solution which will be in harmony with the genius of American institutions and which will comport with our best national interest.

The senate, it is sometimes said, is not always responsive to the popular will. Such assumption is erroneous, judging by the record of legislation accomplished. The will of the people finds utterance in the public law in due course; not that will which is the unreasoning passionate expression of the moment, but that will which is the fruit of deliberate, intelligent reflection.

The senate of the United States was designed by our fathers to be a deliberate chamber in the fullest and best sense—a chamber where the passions of the hour might be arrested and where the better judgment of the people would find ultimate expression. Those who in their unreflecting moments would sweep it away would overturn one of the strongest safeguards of our political fabric.

I cannot sever the personal ties which have been formed here without deep emotion. I am your grateful debtor for countless courtesies and kindnesses, and to your generous assistance and thoughtful forbearance I am indebted for whatever success may have attended my efforts as president of the senate.

It gives me pleasure to acknowledge the very great assistance which the chair has always received from the officers of the senate and from these efficient, faithful gentlemen at the desk.

For the able and distinguished citizen who has been chosen by the people to succeed me I bespeak that considerate and effective support which you have given to me.

I wish for you each many years of strength and devotion to the interests of our common country whose welfare and whose honor you have sought to safeguard and advance with ceaseless vigilance and unvarying fidelity.

Under the operation of law we have reached the close of the sixtieth congress, and it becomes the duty of the chair to declare the senate adjourned without day.

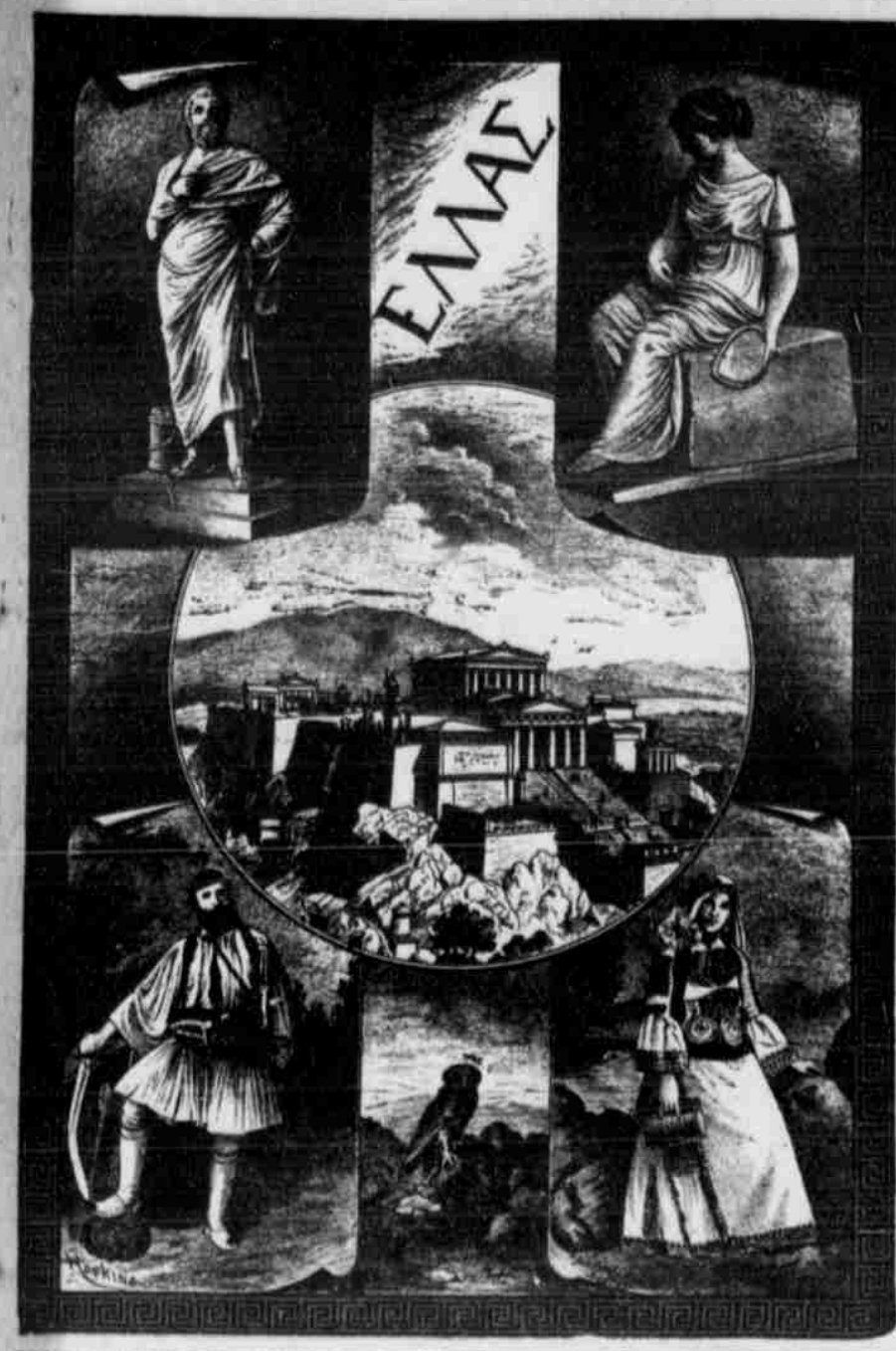

WANTS PLUM FOR  
SMITH OF MARIONOregonian Wants Normal School  
Killer to Be Physician at Pen-  
itentiary.

Salem special to Oregonian: Dr. J. N. Smith, state senator from Marion county, has probably won out in a race for appointment as physician at the state penitentiary, to succeed Dr. J. D. Shaw, the present incumbent. While the appointment has not been announced, many indications point him out as the successful aspirant.

The other candidate for the position is Dr. F. E. Smith, a brother-in-law of Dr. J. N. Smith. The position pays \$900 a year and does not interfere with a physician's regular practice. This will probably be the first change at the penitentiary under the new administration.
