bo, by Gertrude Cook, these the three sisters, who are wards of Ko-Ko; Katisha, an elderly lady, in love with Nanki-poo, by Ethel Cross, and the girls' choruses, nobles, guards and coolies.

Miss Deyo, of the high school, will have charge of the decorating, and she has proven herself so efficient in work of this kind that, with the unlimited material which she has at hand, cannot but have unbounded success. Mr. George Schreiber, art instructor in public schools, will assist. Dr. Epley will have charge of the lighting, and—but his work in this line is too well known to need any mention.
