WELLS FARGO TEAM MAKES FINE RUN AND GREAT FINISH

LEFT WAGON ON STREET WHILE THEY WENT DOWN STAIRS TO GET A TURKISH BATH

The most extraordinary runaway ever occurring in this city happened this morning when the big bay delivery team belonging to the Wells Fargo company became frightened while standing in front of the Capital bakery on Court street at the sound of a falling box, bolted down Court street to Commercial and after turning the corner came south on Commercial at a terrific speed until the corner of Ferry and Commercial streets was reached. When the heavy team and wagon came up to the corner and made an attempt to turn down Ferry east, every person watching the runaway stood on tiptoe and held their breath, as the outfit, unable to make the turn at such high speed, went crashing over the sidewalk of the Willamette hotel and plunged down a twelve-foot stairway only five feet wide. Everybody thought the poor brutes would be brought up at the stairway and buried, as it appeared absolutely impossible for a fifteen hundred pound team to fall such a distance and come out alive, and this would have probably been the result had not the heavy harness checked the fall. As

it was, the two horses were led out of the stairway and after an investigation, it was found that with the exception of a few slight scratches and a cut lip of one of the horses they were in as good condition as before they fell.

A great crowd gathered around the corner of the hotel and in the windows to see the two horses standing side by side in the stairway. How the team could crash into the side of a brick wall and fall twelve feet and remain alive was a mystery to all. At the same time the evidence was there. The big delivery wagon hung over the stairway, while the horses, side by side, in the narrow hall at the foot of the stairway, were holding silent communion with each other and wondering how they got there and what they did it for. One of the horses knocked a little skin off his foot head but the other was uninjured. The wagon was removed, the horses invited up the stairs and hitched to the wagon again, and then they went to work delivering packages for Wells Fargo and realizing that they were too small to interfere with the business of that great corporation.
